





# Gossip can end a relationship



## **Famous Hand**

The 2007 world team championship for the Bermuda Bowl was won by Norway, which easily defeated the United States in the 128-deal final by nearly 100 International Match Points, 334-245.5.

After trailing early, the Norwegians went ahead to stay about a third of the way through the match and continued to build their lead by making one winning decision after another. Today's deal, from the session in which Norway assumed the lead, is a typical example.

When the deal was first played, the Norwegian pair of Boye Brogeland and Erik Saelensminde reached a slam in spades as shown. Saelensminde's decision to open two notrump with a 1-3-6-3 distribution convinced Brogeland to try for slam on the assumption that his side had at least nine spades.

Four diamonds was a slam try in spades, and the rest of the auction consisted primarily of cuebids leading to the slam. With the spades dividing 3-2, the defenders got only the heart ace, so the Norwegians were plus 1,430.

At the other table, with George Jacobs and Ralph Katz of the U.S. North-South, the bidding went:

South West North East 1 [D] Pass 1 [S] Pass 3 NT All Pass

Jacobs, North, considered bidding over three notrump, but this was not as clear-cut as it may seem. As played by most of today's expert partnerships, a rebid of three notrump after opening with one of a minor tends to imply a strong, possibly unbalanced hand containing a long, solid or near-solid suit.

Jacobs therefore had to allow for the possibility that South had only one spade, and chose the conservative course. After a spade lead by West, declarer had no trouble taking all the tricks for a score of 720, but wound up losing 12 IMPs.
