The members of the High Plains ed Methodist Church at 10 a.m. Tuesday, March 10, for their regular monthly meeting.

Program chairman for the month, Mary McNutt, presented a program on American Impressionist Ettore (Ted) DeGrazia.

"DeGrazia was born in Morenci, Ariz., on June 14, 1909, to Italian immigrants," McNutt said, "and he overcame a language problem to graduate from high school and earn three degrees in music and art at the University of Arizona.

"His extensive art works included 15,000 originals, including oil paintings, watercolors, ceramics and sculptures. In 1960, he gained international acclaim when his painting, 'El Nino,' was chosen as the UNICEF greeting card that sold millions world-wide.

"His great passions were the Superstition Mountains, the superstition of gold hidden there and his Indian and Mexican friends, who rode into the region on long trips with him.

"In 1976 DeGrazia, to protest inheritance taxes on works of art, hauled about 100 of his paintings on horseback into the Superstitions near Phoenix and set them on fire. This became a part of De-Grazia's legend when he died on Sept. 17, 1982, heralded as one of Arizona's favorite artists,"

His works are on display at the DeGrazia Gallery in the Sun, in Tucson.

Art club President Marlene Carpenter called the business portion of the meeting to order. The club's recent portrait-painting workshop was discussed, and Treasurer Bev Kern turned in the workshop financial report to Secretary Marj Brown so she can compile a final report for the Thomas County Community Foundation, which gave a grant from the Betty and James Secrest Endowment for the Arts to the club for the workshop.

All members voiced agreement Art Club met in the Colby Unit- that the workshop was a big success and that out-of-town participants were pleased with instructor John Scott, an artist from Hoxie. They hope to plan another workshop soon. Many of the members brought their finished portraits to

exhibit. The Downtown Art Jubilee was discussed and Brown suggested they wait until August 2010 to have it so it will coordinate with Colby's All School Reunion. All

agreed. Communications about other workshops and shows in other areas were passed around, after which the meeting was adjourned.

The members went to lunch together, visited the home of Maxine Nelson to see the portraits she had painted and then returned to the church to work on their individual projects.


