## Test yourself in solving mysteries

Next Thursday, I'll attend the "Great High School WhoDunit" mystery put on by students at the Colby High School. Before the event, the forensics team will serve a soup supper to provide participants with the strength to solve the mystery.

In honor of all the hard work of those in the high school and those who helped create a very successful Murder Mystery at the library, this week's Library Link focuses on new mysteries that can be found both in print and CD versions of audio books

The first item is "Exit Music," by Ian Rankin. This 17th and last great mystery solved by detective Rebus will captivate the reader. It is set in Scotland and involves Russian businessmen, local politicians and of course the local gangster boss of the area.

The plot begins with a famed poet being killed and dumped on the sidewalk near the library and a parking garage. A single lady and elderly married couple come upon this gruesome scene.

Enter Detective Rebus and his new partner, Detective Sgt. Siobbook, Sgt. Clarke is called Siobhan, and may become Rankin's next great character.

The second suspense thriller mystery is "Rough Weather" by Robert B. Parker. Parker displays his wry banter and creative dialogue starting with the second page of the book. Protagonist Spencer finds himself in his office when in walks the beautiful, wealthy and elegant Heidi Bradshaw. The banter immediately begins.

Bradshaw asks Spencer to be her substitute husband during the wedding of her daughter at Ms. Bradshaw's private island. Spencer finds himself sharing the island with an arch rival. A number of murders and other notorious events create bedlam.

A newly released audio book is "Lethal Legacy" by Linda Fairstein, read by Blair Brown. This story is set in the New York Public Library, where a homicide investigation leads into the area rare books and maps.

Another audio book now available is "Mounting Fears" by Stuart Woods, read by Carrington MacDuffie. This suspenseful story weaves news in a race for re-election and circumstances, but helps us hope that there are people who can get us out of a mess larger than life.

A third audio book is "Fire and Ice" by Julie Garwood, read by Rebecca Lowman. Sophie Rose, a newspaper reporter finds herself working in a small town covering local events. She, however, is dogged by her past and must make a trek to Alaska to complete a mystery that surrounds a crime. There she must deal with FBI agent Jack MacAlister, who wants to know how she fits into this mystery. Their relationship develops the story into a romantic thriller.


