About 12 years ago, I had my first email address. It was a great way to connect

to a girlfriend who lived 11 hours away. We were able to talk and respond in a matter of seconds, giving us an opportunity to get to know each other better. It worked out well, because we were married about a year later.

Then I was introduced to instant messaging. We were able to talk simultaneous for hours without it costing anything. This, also, was an opportunity to get to know each other better, but it was no substitution for the times we could spend with each other in person.

All this was before text messagcommercial where a dad was going so overboard with text messaging that he was texting his kids to say "Pass the ketchup."

These electronic messages have allowed people to be more connected with each other. As a minister, I utilize this tool to keep up with people, wish them luck, send out encouraging quotes, and wish them "Happy Birthday."

Texting has its advantages. It allows for husbands and wives to talk to each other. A recent study said that 70 percent of spouses with their own cell phones will contact with each other throughout the day. In contrast to only 54 percent of those with only one cell phone would contact each other throughout the day. This feature does make it easier to for couples stay connected.


