Three Colby High School forensics students competed at the Kansas Catholic Forensics League National Qualifier in Garnett on March 20 and 21.

Christina Ostmeyer competed in Dramatic Performance - Serious, Gray Henry in Dramatic Per-

formance - Humorous and Oral Interpretation of Literature and Kayla Sloan in Original Oration and Extemporaneous Speaking.

Sloan finished in the top 12 in Original Oration and seventh in Extemporaneous Speaking. Henry finished eighth in Dramatic Per-

formance - Humorous and third in Oral Interpretation of Literature.

Those two qualified for the National Catholic Forensics League Grand National Tournament in Albany, N.Y., on May 23 and 24. Henry in Oral Interpretation of Literature (Prose/Poetry) and Sloan as an alternate in Extemporaneous Speaking. They will be going to Albany over Memorial Day weekend to compete against students from across the nation.
