Kids planning menu for Brewster lunchroom

What happens when kids get to make up the menu for the school cafeteria?

Ice cream for the main course and bubble gum for dessert?

Well, there are some rules. The menu has to meet federal nutrition guidelines. And before they started, the kids had to study why nutrition is important.

Last Thursday, Brewster fourth graders chose cheese quesadillas, veggie sticks, seven-layer salad, orange and apple slices, rolls and chocolate-chip cookies.

The menu they chose had the proper mixture of protein, vegetables, fruit and grains, and made a colorful plate, said Nancy Mills, head cook at the Brewster school.

Brewster Grade School was on the list this year for a visit from Body Venture, a display sent to rural schools by the state Department of Education to teach students in the primary grades about good nutrition.

the bones and the skin.

The students learned why they need to eat smart in order to study and play hard.

"Body Venture is presented to kindergarten through fifth grade, and is sent around to schools every two to three years," Mills said. "The kids always look forward to having the display.³

After the study ends, she said, each class gets to make a menu of their choice. They have to put together a meal that's nutritious, with attractive color on the lunch plate, according to nutrition guidelines.

Last week, it was the fourth graders' turn. This week, second graders have chosen a menu.


Kahuna Beach Party isn't just a band, the group says, it's an event. With a mix of music, comedy and audience participation, it's the party band for you.



Eric B. Banks, state conservationist for Kansas, said the 2008 Farm Bill provided for a continuous sign-up.

"We changed the Kansas Farm and Ranch Lands Protection Program, designating all counties as eligible...," Banks said.

Groups eligible for money under the program include state, tribal or local governments and nongovernment organizations that have an established farm-and-ranch-land protection program, Banks said. They must have the authority to hold and manage easements; have the capacity to acquire, manage,

contribution. Landowners need to work with an eligible agency or group in

submitting applications, he said. They must submit applications by May 22 for Fiscal Year 2009.

Land proposed for the program must contain at least 50 percent prime and unique farmland soils and soils of statewide and local importance, contain historic or archeological resources, or land that supports the protection policies of state or local programs.

Owners must have an income of less than \$1 million and comply with requirements for erodible land and wetland protection.

Application go to the state office in Salina. The best parcels will be selected for the program, Banks said. Ranking and selection will be done immediately after the deadline.

The program has enrolled over 14,000 acres on 12 farms and ranches in Kansas since Congress reauthorized it in 2002, Banks said.


