The Colby Visitor Center, at I-70 and exit 53, has a unique contemporary design. The structure is an authentic grain storage bin, designed to recognize the importance of grain and agriculture to this area. It presents an attractive welcome to visitors coming off the interstate.

The center is owned and operated by the Colby Convention and Visitors Bureau. (785) 460-0076.

Northwest Kansas Extension-Research Center provides many photo opportunities. It exists on the 720 acres of the Northwest Kansas Extension-Research Center located at 1056 Experiment Farm Road, off West Fourth Street in western Colby.

The visitor can view plots of trees, colorful flowers and grains, all labeled for easy identification. Enjoy the shade and quiet oasis amid beautiful flowers and peaceful surroundings. (785) 462-6281.

Colby Community College, founded in 1964, is located on 80 beautifully landscaped acres. The college offers two year associate degrees and programs, transferable to four year universities.

The unique Bea Davis Clock tower can be seen in the center of the campus. Ad Astera, a prototype of the sculpture on the Kansas Capitol building is in the circle drive of the library. The beautiful Frahm Theatre stands at the east end of the campus. The college is located at 1255 South Range. It is noted for its veterinary technician, dental hygiene, li-

Fike Park is the major city park and is located in downtown Colby at the north end of Franklin Avenue, the town's main street, beginning at the City Hall. There are tennis courts, horseshoe pits, volleyball area and basketball courts. There are two gazebos, one for picnics.
