More dogs at large expected in summer

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After three days of hearing reports about a dog on the loose in Colby, the city police department finally tracked down the animal on Tuesday afternoon and catching it was no easy

Once the police located the dog on Tuesday it took them about an hour and 30 minutes to catch him, said Chief of Police Randy Jones. The chase ended on the right side of the road on S. Franklin Avenue near the Prairie Museum of Art and History. The dog had hunkered down in the weeds by the road, while police officers attempted to get it controlled and into a police truck nearby.

"The dog was exhausted and didn't want to be touched," said Jones.

The dog was medium sized with a white coat and brown spots. Jones said he thought it was part basset hound.

Jones said they had been receiving reports of the dog going through trash and eating a dead squirrel that was lying on the road.

"The dog had no collar, so no one knows who it belongs to," Jones said.

Dogs, cats and birds are all included in the city code for at-large animals. According to the city code, it is unlawful for animal owners to permit those animals to run loose in the city. Animals that are outside need to be on leashes. The only exception are law enforcement K9

The police department sees an increase in animals at large this time of year, Jones said, due to the improving weather. More people are out and about with their pets, especially kids. Officers got to work pulling the weeds out Many people let animals outside, which then

> Some animals at large come from traffic on I-70, Jones said. Many people travel through with pets and let them out when they stop, where some run away.

"They might not even know it until they are 100 miles down the road," Jones said.

Procedure in these cases is to track the animal and impound it. The animal is first taken to the Colby Animal Clinic to check for any diseases. If an owner can be identified, a citation and fine may be issued instead of impounding the animal. The fine can be up to \$1,000.

Jones advises Colby residents not to approach strange dogs, they can sometimes be unpredictable. If an owner is present, their permission should be asked before petting the

If a dog or other animal is running at large, please contact the police department.
