





DIRTY TILE GROUT? I would like to not have to do a lot of "crawling." -- A Reader, via e-mail

I have two "recipes" for grout cleaning. Unfortunately, I don't have a solution to the bending and crawling problem!

1. Mix a solution of 1/2 chlorine bleach and 1/2water and apply to the grout using an old toothbrush or cotton swab. Leave the solution on for about 20 minutes (longer may not work better), then rinse.

2. Three percent hydrogen peroxide applied directly to the grout also works. Use an old toothbrush to apply, let sit for an hour or more and then scrub. Rinse with water. Note: For both of these methods, you should wear rubber gloves and old clothing or an apron. Both can bleach color from carpet, clothing, towels, etc. So use caution, and be sure the room is well-ventilated. -- Heloise

TRAVEL HINT

Dear Heloise: Since the airlines now limit the amount of liquid that can go in carry-on bags, I prepare bottles of liquids to go in with my clothes, and I came up with an idea to reduce leakage.

The bottle should be only 3/4 full, due to the possibility of expansion. I put it in a zip-top plastic bag. Before sealing the bag, I fold up four to five paper towels and place them in the bag along with the bottle. I seal the bag, and then the whole thing goes into a second plastic zip-top bag. Hopefully, if any liquid were to leak out into the first bag, it would be absorbed by the paper towels and would not go any farther. The paper towels also provide a little bit of padding for the bottles. -- Debbie Carlson, Omaha, Neb.

TINY-BATHROOM DILEMMA



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



You lead the queen of hearts to the king and return a trump from dummy, South following with the three. Do you play the king or finesse? T. . . .

Test Your Play

1. This is not an uncommon situation, and if you don't know the theoretically correct play, it's high time to get acquainted with it. After your left-hand opponent drops the jack under your ace (he might be playing that card either because it is a singleton or because he chose to play it from the Q-J doubleton), you will do better in the long run to finesse the ten on the second round rather than play the king. The odds are about 12-to-7 in favor of the finesse, and you should not buck those odds unless there is a good reason to do so. The theory that applies to this largely mathematical problem is commonly called "restricted choice."

2. Win the diamond lead with your queen and draw the adverse trumps, ending in dummy. Cash the A-K of diamonds, discarding your K-J of hearts on them. The contract is now certain because, at worst, your only losers will be three club tricks. You treat your K-J of hearts exactly the same way as you would if they were the 3-2.

It would be wrong to discard two clubs on the A-K of diamonds. You might wind up losing two heart tricks and two club tricks if, for example, North started with something like:
