

Forensics duo back from nationals

Junior Gray Henry competed in oral interpretation of literature and senior Kayla Sloan ttended the meet as an alternate in extempo raneous speaking.

Henry placed third in oral interpretation of literature at the regional competition at Garnett to earn a spot in nationals. The top six scores in regionals advance to nationals, said Nancy Rundel, forensics coach and instructor to participate, Rundel said. at Colby High School.

Congressional candidate visits Colby

Although the general election is still more than a year away, the race for the Republican nomination to represent "The Big First" congressional district is already shaping up.

One candidate, State Sen. Tim Huelskamp, a Republican from Fowler who represents Ford, Gray, Meade, Clark, Haskell and Seward counties, held a "meet-and-greet" at Colby Community College on Sunday and dropped by the *Colby* Free Press on Monday.

Huelskamp, a farmer, has spent the last 13 years as a state senator. ple. He announced that he would seek the nomination after Rep. Jerry Moran said he would be running

for U.S. Senate in 2010.

Huelskamp said his experience kbottrell@nwkansas.com as both a state lawmaker and a critical for an agriculture-based farmer from a rural area make him a good fit for District 1, which includes 69 mainly rural counties in a conservative platform, and esthe central and western parts of Kansas. He said he already is used to driving long distances to talk to constituents.

"The issues we fight in Topeka are the same as the issues we fight in Washington," Huelskamp

He said his interest in politics went back to the Russian grain embargo, when he realized how political decisions can affect peo-

"I recognized then that what Washington does has an impact - especially on agriculture," he

Huelskamp said free trade is economy like that of most rural Kansas counties. He said he has pecially disagrees with many of the current administration's heavy spending policies, saying that they are creating a problem for ordinary citizens in the future.

"We need to make sure people can make a living here," he said. "To understand and know that you have to live it."

State Sen. Ralph Ostmeyer, who represents the 18-county 40th District that includes Thomas County, came in with Huelskamp, giving the candidate his endorsement. Ostmeyer said he had served with Huelskamp for many years, and

the two share an office in Topeka. He said he has endorsed Huelkamp because of his colleague's experience and record.

"You can check how he votes," Ostmeyer said. "He talks the talk, he walks the walk.

Ostmeyer said he also is endors-

ing Moran for the Senate. The open seat has brought out five other candidates for the Republican nomination for Congress: State Sen. Jim Barnett, an Emporia physician; Rob Wasinger, chief of staff to Sen. Sam Brownback; Timothy Barker, chief operating officer of Orion Ethanol; Sue Boldra, a teacher and real estate agent in Hays; and Tracey Mann, vice president of a real estate company in Salina. No Democratic candidate has been announced yet.

Library earns national nod over cake pans

District looks at capital outlay

the Colby School Board may use money from the Capital Outlay fund for equipment purchases and repairs, which could mean higher taxes for Colby residents and businesses to keep the fund afloat.

Superintendent Terrell Harrison told the board Monday the district will need the money for scheduled upgrades to technology and equipment. For instance, she said, two of the district's activity buses, the kind that haul kids to events such as away games, will be 20 years the district to replace buses at 20 subject at the previous meeting years, she said, and they are not May 18.

said the district had been using money from the supplemental general fund for capital items because there was no property tax levy to replenish the capital outlay fund. Sixty-five percent of the supplemental general fund comes from Thomas County property tax levies, she said, but the supplemental fund can only be as big as 30 percent of the general fund. That's too small to make some purchases and repairs, she said. The general fund is mainly used up by salaries. DeYoung said the capital outlay fund currently has about \$450,000
