Buddhism influences West

Most of us think of Buddhism as a religion or a philosophy of the Far East, but we, in the West are learning more about this very ancient religion.

The Dalai Lama of Tibet has become a familiar figure in popular culture as he has spoken out about the Chinese takeover of his country, and in spite of that, has urged for peaceful ways to co-exist.

The yellow-robed Buddhist monks of Burma (Myanmar) made headlines last year when they led peaceful protests against the military regime in their country.

As technology has made our world smaller, we have become more aware of faiths and beliefs that previously had seemed very foreign. And in recent decades, Buddhism has had a greater influence on religion in this country, particularly in the areas of spirituality and meditation.

However, many people do not even consider Buddhism to be a religion because there is no worship of any other deity. Instead, take drugs or drink intoxicating the focus is on developing an inner spiritual life that leads to a truer reality than our external senses are able to perceive.

Buddhism began about 2,500 years ago when Siddhartha Gautama, a prince in what is now Nepal, decided to leave his royal heritage for an aesthetic life of prayer and austere living. Eventually he came to preach the Middle Way—a path of moderation that lies midway between the extremes of self-indulgence and self-mortification.

He taught self-awareness, which included detachment from mundane living and not being controlled by one's emotions. He taught meditation as a way to find release from self-distractions and to find an inner harmony within the self. He also taught about karma - that how we act toward others will have consequences that tices involve simplicity of living,

will eventually come back to us.

He became known as the Buddha, or Enlightened One, and his teachings began to spread on the Indian peninsula and throughout the Far East.

There are Four Noble Truths in Buddhism:

• Life is suffering.

• The cause of suffering is desire for self-fulfillment.

• The cure for selfish craving is to move away from focus on self to focus on the universal.

• The way to do this is the eight-fold path, which includes: right knowledge, right aspiration, right speech, right behavior (do not kill, steal, or lie, be unchaste, beverages), right occupations that promote and not destroy life, right effort, right mindfulness, since ignorance is life's primary enemy, and right absorption, that is seeking the infinite through pure living and meditation.

Although these are the basic tenets of Buddhism, numerous distinct groups have developed since the passing of the Buddha, with diverse teachings that vary widely in practice, philosophical empha-

Most of these differences come from the countries where the religion is practiced. Because there are so many variations and because practices can be so individualized, it is impossible to explain or give specifics of Buddhist worship and other rituals.

Some who practice yoga incorporate it into their spiritual lives, while for others it is simply a means of physical well being.

About one-sixth of the world's population is Buddhist, making Buddhism is the fourth-largest religion behind Christianity, Islam and Hinduism.
