



Soda cleans microwave oven

Dear Heloise: How do you get a FOOD STAIN out of a microwave? - Debbie Brown, Texarka-

Practically every home and office has a microwave, but the truth is that keeping it stain-free is a constant chore. Of course, the best thing to do is clean a food spill ASAP!

Just add 2 to 3 tablespoons baking soda to 1 cup water in a large, microwave-safe bowl. Microwave on high for 2 or 3 minutes, or until the water boils. You must leave the microwave door closed for about 10-15 minutes, since the water is superheated and could scald!

The steam softens the gunk so you can wipe it away. If a tough stain like spaghetti doesn't budge, try rubbing it with a soft cloth, water and baking soda. The baking soda will help get rid of smells, too. Baking soda is one of my all-timefavorite multipurpose cleaners. It's cheap, safe, and you usually have it on hand. I have put together great money-saving hints using baking soda around your home. 
This is a good reminder. It's very important to keep appliances clean, not only for health reasons, but also to keep them working properly. -Heloise

Bridge Is a Psychological Game

To know what an opponent has and what he is thinking, and to then put this knowledge to good use, is the mark of a very good player. Sometimes you have to put yourself in the opponent's shoes to get the best result.

This deal is an exercise in card-reading and psychology. Suppose you're sitting East, defending against four hearts. West leads a diamond, and you take two diamond tricks. What would you lead now?

When the hand occurred, East returned the six of spades! As a result of this play, he defeated the contract.

Of course, South could have made 11 tricks once the spade was led, and anyone reading this 32 column would surely do so after seeing the East-West hands. But to understand why declarer went down, you have to imagine you're South and see only the North-South hands.

From South's viewpoint, the spade play at trick three has all the earmarks of a singleton. Why else would East return a spade into dummy's A-Q-J when he has a natural club return?


So when you win the spade in dummy and lead the queen of hearts, and East follows low, it seems risky to finesse, because if West has the king, he'll take it and give his partner a spade ruff to defeat the contract. You therefore go up with the ace of hearts and

return a heart. East takes the king and leads a club. You win and confidently take the spade finesse, but East, the rascal, produces the king, and down you go. If you're not too upset by what East did to you, you congratulate him for his fine play. East's spade return makes lots of sense when

you think about it. He knows South must have the A-K of clubs for his opening bid, and that a club return is therefore futile. If South is left to his own devices, he is sure to take a heart finesse and make the contract. East's only hope, therefore, is to try to divert South from the winning line of play by giving him something else to think about.
