

Hints from Heloise

Why use unsalted butter?

Dear Heloise: Why do so many recipes call for UNSALTED BUTTER yet still call for salt in the recipe? I already stock real butter, margarine and soft spread in my fridge and really don't see the need to have unsalted butter as well. It has been necessary for us to watch our salt intake, and I never use salt in my baking since there is already enough in the soda or baking powder. - Margaret Rasmussen, Hill City, S.D.

Margaret, salted and unsalted butter are exactly the same, except one has salt added! Seems obvious, I know! Salt was originally added (1/4 or 1/2 teaspoon of salt per stick) to help it last longer. Salted butter is probably what most people have at home, but unsalted is good for those on a lowsodium diet. If a recipe calls for salted or unsalted butter, either can be used.

You don't really need to adjust the salt asked for in the recipe if you use the unsalted. Unless you are using a lot of butter, there isn't very much in a portion size. - Heloise

I start with a can of a "chunky' type of soup as a base and add one can of beef or chicken broth (depending on the variety of soup), a can of protein-rich beans and 2 tablespoons of whole-grain couscous.


The beans add extra protein and fiber, the broth stretches the volume, and the couscous thickens the soup and adds yet more healthy fiber. E M Sometimes, I'll add a can of vegetable juice if I've started with a tomato-based soup. I vary the beans, such as cannelloni and kidney beans. By the time the soup is good and hot, the couscous is already tender. These home-blended soups are even better when reheated the next day. Delicious! – David G., Washington, D.C.

Cooperative Defense

The uppercut is a colorful term used to describe a play made by a defender whereby he is able to promote a trump trick for his partner. It is a play that can be very profitable for the defense when the occasion arises. South reached four spades on the bidding

shown, and West made the normal lead of the ten of clubs. East took dummy's queen with the ace and returned the jack of diamonds. Declarer covered with the king, and West won with the ace and cashed the queen for the defense's third trick.

West now paused to consider where the setting trick might come from. He reasoned that if East had the queen or king of spades, the contract could be defeated provided East could be induced to ruff a third round of diamonds with either of those cards.

West was afraid that if he returned a low diamond at this point, East might ruff low, thinking declarer had the nine of diamonds. West also feared that if he led the nine instead, East might discard, since the nine was the highest diamond remaining.

Ultimately, it boiled down to a question of having faith in partner and hoping East would do the right thing regardless of which diamond West West made the proper technical return of the


nine, hoping East would appreciate the situation, and East did not let him down. He realized that declarer had no more diamonds, since South had dropped the ten on the preceding trick. East therefore ruffed the diamond nine with the

queen. Declarer had no choice but to overruff, and West's jack became the setting trick. East's play was clearly correct. He had noth-

ing to lose by ruffing if declarer had the A-K-J of spades, and a good deal to gain if West had as little as the J-x.
