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New principal feels at home in Brewster

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George Staaten, the new prekindergarten through high school principal and superintendent of the Brewster schools, is no stranger to western Kansas.

Although he grew up in Wichita, his 20-year career in education has found him spending all but two of those years in western Kansas schools.

"It looks like I'm home, and I'm looking forward to serving the Brewster schools," he said.

Staaten began his school career in the Copeland-Montezuma school system in 1989, and then moved to Logan for five years. The next six years he spent in Jewell, followed by two years as the high school principal in Ness City. His last assignment was two years in Chepota in southeast Kansas.

for Acciona Energy, met with the pany looks for financial backers to Thomas County commissioners Monday to give them an update on the Solomon Forks Wind Farm utility in the Southwest Power project.

Keenon said Acciona uses its own Colby Free Press capital assets to pay for the construction of its wind farms. After the farms are completed and util-Peter Keenon, project developer ity contracts finalized, the com-

Keenon said the 108 megawatt wind farm is essentially ready for beginning construction. Surveys, including aerial, wind speed and hazardous materials studies, have all been completed. Keenon said that, as originally planned, the project near Mingo would be under construction right now, but delays have set construction back by months. Acciona has been planning the project for about a year, having acquired the project from its original developer last July.

"It's been a slow burn for us," Keenon said.

Currently, Acciona is looking for utilities to contract with for the power generated at the wind farm.

Acciona can contract with any Pool, a bulk energy co-op that spans Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma as well as parts of Missouri, New Mexico, Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas.

Since the project is so far along, Keenon said, the company can bid far more accurately for power contracts.

"Being ready to go, it's very competitive with projects that aren't as far along," he said.

Keenon said the company had intended to sell the power generated by the wind farm into the open market. However, the drop in natural gas prices has affected overall energy prices. Overall
