Onions like rain, hate weeds and grass

Talk to just about any wheat farmer around the area and you'll immediately notice the smile on his face. For those who escaped the hailstorms, it has been a good summer in the field, although the recent price drop took a bit of the edge off the final numbers.

It has been much the same story for the backyard gardener this spring and summer, as timely rains and the absence of triple-digit heat have been most welcome. Garden crops, for the most part, have thrived and the harvest has been good.

The exceptions are mostly gardeners who just weren't able to keep ahead of the weeds, which have thrived right along side of the garden crop. No vegetable in the garden seems to be bothered more than those big sweet onions. If you have an onion patch that is overrun with weeds or various kinds of grasses, chances are pretty good that those onions have suffered.

Onions hate competition from anything, especially weeds. They must be kept weed-free during the critical spring and early garden season or they just won't develop into those big, mild globes of flavor that everyone is looking for.

Indeed, weeds in the onion patch are a serious problem. But the most serious problem in producing a good-sized onion is lack of moisture. If those rows or onions don't receive ample moisture during the spring and summer growing season, you can write them off.

No vegetable crop in the backyard garden requires as much water as the onion! After all, the onion is about 90 percent water. If they are not watered regularly, they will not grow to their potential size and will likely be much more pungent than you'd like. From the day you set them out in early spring until just a few days before harvesting, they must not

be allowed to dry out.

My onions seem to be in good shape, and I have actually harvested the early variety, known as Texas Supersweets or 1015Y. The size was very good, but more importantly, they are indeed very mild. I also have a couple of rows of Candy, a row of the white Super Star and a row of the new Candy Apple Red.

All look pretty good. They have all begun the flopping process, which big onions do naturally. When they are through growing, they simply fall over, as if to tell you they have done their best for you, and now are almost ready to

Keep them wet for a week or so after the entire row flops and then pull them and spread them out in a shady spot until the tops turn brown. Do not cut off the tops until you are ready to use them, or until you are ready to store them for fall and winter.

Storage should be in the root cellar, but since you probably don't have one, find the darkest, coolest environment there is around your place, and use them with delight for as long as they last.

A good onion crop means you have worked hard in your garden this summer. No vegetable requires more attention and management than the onion. I hope your hard work has paid off for you with an abundant crop.


