# Apostle's history prepared him

This article is part one of a short series on the Apostle Paul's

life and ministry. Perhaps the greatest missionary of all time was the Apostle Paul, a man who truly loved to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ. His love for Christ and the work of the Lord constantly pulled at his heart. Paul's personal religious experience is set forth in his own words: "I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ lives in me, and the life which I now live in the flesh, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me, and gave Himself for me" (Galatians 2:20).

It is believed that Paul was born about the same time as Jesus, in the city of Tarsus in southern Asia Minor, which is Turkey today. Paul's parents gave him the Hebrew name Saul, perhaps in honor of King Saul. However, the name that he is known by most of the time in the New Testament is the Latin name of Paulus, or Paul.

Tarsus was also the home of one of three principal universities of that time. Students from numerous countries were always seen and heard in the streets. Paul was given a special education.
