Supporters give magazines, videos for library's collection

The Pioneer Memorial Library is what it is because of the people in this community who support its efforts and projects. Did you know its original inception came when a group calling themselves the Civic League of Women rented a small room in the front of Dr. Beaver's residence in 1911? Thereafter,

they gathered books from relatives, friends and their own homes.

In 1926, the library fell on hard times. On Jan. 1, 1926, the library was closed due to a shortage of money and space. This, however, did not sit well with some forward-looking citizens. They met with the city council and on March 14, 1926, (just 2 months later) the Colby Public Library was organized.

It was located in the Connelly building, and moved to City Hall in 1936. A permanent location was purchased and a building constructed in 1961. In 1999, a beautifully integrated addition was added to the original building. In 2007, a basement renovation project was complete.

basis to help the library have excellent resources. The Friends of the Pioneer Memorial Library, Adopt-A-Magazine is just such a project. Each year the Friends send out a call for you, the patron to adopt a magazine for a year. We have subscriptions to almost 110 magazines. The subscription costs \$25 a year. Hence, we ask you, the citizen, to help us have magazines for everyone in the community to enjoy. In 2008, our magazine circulation was up by 2.2 percent. We currently have about 22 magazines checked out per day. This means more people may check out a magazine instead of stressing their per-

We have also been helped recently in purchasing non-fiction DVD's through a grant from the Thomas County Attorney Special Law Enforcement Fund of the Thomas County Community Foundation. The five-disc series "Great Artists" is now available. The first is on Giotto and Leonard da Vinci; the second on Dürer, Michelangelo, and Raphael. The third disc tells about Titian, Bruegel, and El Greco; the fourth Rubens, Velazquez, and Rembrandt; and the fifth Vermer, Turner, and Van Gogh. We have also added the DVD "Masterpieces of Sculpture," by BBC video, covering the work of Michelangelo, Degas, and Rodin. Many community may enjoy the DVD, "Norman Rockwell: An American Portrait." Anotherr three-video set is: "Art: 21," by PBS Home Video. We have seasons one through four that discuss as many as 20 artists on one DVD. Because these cover many of the new-era artists, you can discover what their specialty is, and why they were chosen to represent the huge field of creative art.


