She got her real start in the food and beverage industry by working two years with the Ramada Inn Restaurant, and then the Quality Inn. She also split her time at the Ramada and Quality Inn by spending 18 summers off and on with the Jim Deibert harvest crew.

"Waiting tables wasn't the first and only experience I had with food," Saddler said. "Family and cooking sort of went together when I was a girl growing up in Omaha. My grandmother was an incredible cook, and my mom followed in my grandmother's footsteps. Out of the four kids in my family, three wound up with careers in the food and beverage industry."

She said the best part of her job is interacting with people.

Although she has no formal training in the food industry, Saddler attend workshops, observes and learns. She plans food events for crowds as large as 500 plus, and as small as a few people for a luncheon. She has a full catering menu, and caters meals and finger food events to businesses, retirement functions. They also go into private homes to do parties, provide cocktail waitresses and clean up for private parties. They can prepare the food and cater it in, or come and do the cooking and clean up in the individual's home, she said.

Food for 500 isn't a big deal, Saddler said. The kitchen at the convention center is entirely different from the City Limits restaurant

> Saddler said the staff has had almost no turnover in her six and a half years.

"It couldn't happen without my amazing staff," she said. "I have never had to let any one go. I have lost two people, and it was because they moved away to other things."

For fun, Sadder likes to help her husband Chuck with the cattle, and even leaves the job for an hour once in a while to help him move farm equipment from field to field.

'That wouldn't be possible either, if I didn't have the staff and boss I have here," she said. "They are all just the best."
