State expects swine flu vaccine by next Tuesday

side effects, including soreness, swelling and redness around the injection. Bremby said the Food and Drug Administration, the Centers for Disease Control and the department would be watching to make sure there are not any more serious side effects.

The National Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices has made several recommendations on who should get the vaccine first. Bremby said Kansas would be following those. The committee recommends targeting pregnant women, children who live with or care for younger children, health care and emergency medical service

personnel, everyone up to 24 and those ages 25 to 64 years who have a chronic immune disorder.

Bremby said the department recommends that the first people to get the vaccine should be children ages 2 to 9 and health-care workers who have direct contact with patients.

The vaccine has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration, but has not been licensed for use with pregnant women, people with chronic diseases or people over 49. Bremby said that, while the vaccine should be considered safe, the manufacturer decided not to pursue a license for those patients because testing showed it worked

best among younger, healthy patients.

Bremby said a second vaccine that would cover those groups could be out as early as two weeks from now.

Bremby said the state is contracting with many clinic to distribute the vaccine, and that as a condition of the contract, they will have to distribute first to the recommended groups.

Eberhart-Philips said the department is encouraging people not to ignore the regular seasonal flu, and to get that vaccination as well.

Bremby said the H1N1 flu is unusual because it came much earlier than the normal flu season, mid-fall to mid-spring. It is also

unusual because it struck a much younger demographic than the seasonal flu. Bremby said that many flu viruses have been at their worst when they first begin infecting the general population and then become less virulent over time.

"It seems reasonable to expect that this virus will become a seasonal strain that will be around for a while," Bremby said.

He said the genetic makeup of H1N1 is fairly stable, meaning that if you have had it, you're unlikely to get it again unless the strain mutates down the road.

Six deaths have been attributed to H1N1 so far in Kansas, he said.

King Tut artifacts to be displayed in Denver museum

DENVER — "Tutankhamun: The Golden King and the Great Pharaohs," a touring exhibition featuring more than 100 treasures from the tomb of the celebrated pharaoh and other ancient sites, will make its sole regional appearance at the Denver Art Museum from July 1 to Jan. 2, 2011.

The exhibition is organized by National Geographic, Arts and Exhibitions International and AEG Exhibitions, with cooperation from the Egyptian Supreme Council of Antiquities.

"This exquisite exhibition is sure to be a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for visitors from Denver and around the region to experience the art of ancient Egypt right here in the Mile High City," said Lewis Sharp, museum director.

Tickets will go on sale in spring.

Museum members will get notification about priority booking and discounted tickets, and will have the first opportunity to buy tickets. The museum will have expanded hours during the show. Part of the proceeds will go to antiquities preservation and conservation efforts in Egypt, including the construction of a new grand museum in Cairo.

The exhibition will feature

striking objects from some of the most important rulers throughout 2,000 years of ancient Egyptian history, from the Fourth Dynasty into the Late Period (about 2,600 to 660 B.C.). Derived from a variety of contexts, including temples and both royal and private tombs, many of these artifacts have never before visited the United States.

The collection features the largest image of King Tut ever unearthed, a 10-foot statue of the pharaoh found at the remains of the funerary temple of two of his high officials. It still retains much of its original paint.

A video introduction, narrated by "Indiana Jones" actor Harrison Ford, begins with the discovery of Tut's tomb by British explorer Howard Carter in 1922. Guests will encounter legendary artifacts from the burial site's antechamber, annex, treasury and burial chamber in corresponding galleries, including the pharaoh's golden sandals, jewelry, furniture, weaponry and statuary.

The exhibition is expected to be a major travel and tourism draw for the city of Denver and the state of Colorado, said Richard Scharf, president of Visit Denver, the pri-

vate, no-profit trade association responsible for marketing Denver as a convention and leisure destination.

Business and leisure tour groups can begin ticketing for Tutankhamun by calling the museum to receive priority booking when tickets go on sale.

Concerned dad in Iraq helps get kids to school

LAWRENCE (AP) — Some students in Lawrence who couldn't ride a bus to school this year have been rescued by student's dad who's working in Iraq.

Budget cuts forced the Lawrence school district to end bus service this year for students who live within 2.5 miles of their schools.

That meant Lee Hamlet's daughter and about 15 children in her area had to walk to school

or depend on sporadic transportation.

So Hamlet sent word from Basra, Iraq, that he would pay \$1,750 for a First Student bus to take the children to school, and he'll pay more money for the second semester. The new bus route for the students began Thursday.

Susan Hamlet says her husband has worked for two years and three months in Iraq and wanted to do the right thing for his daughter.

State concerned by low tax revenue

TOPEKA (AP) — Kansas' tax collections were \$67 million less than anticipated in September, leading to talk of additional budget cuts.

The state Department of Revenue released preliminary figures indicating that tax collections fell 12.5 percent below the official forecast for the month. The department expected to collect \$535 million and took in about \$468 million, leaving a possible budget gap.

Tax collections had kept pace with the forecast in July and August, the first two months of the state's 2010 fiscal year. That had inspired hope that revenues were stabilizing and the state wouldn't have to trim its spending again.

The state already has had four rounds of spending cuts and budget adjustments to keep from running a deficit. Gov. Mark Parkinson and his fellow Democrats resisted some reductions sought by many Republicans, arguing the state should wait to see whether they were really needed.

"The prognosticators in government who argued that this day may not come now have to deal with the fact that it's here," said House Appropriations Committee Chairman Kevin Yoder, an Overland Park Republican.

Yoder said Parkinson should use his power as governor to make changes in the budget himself when legislators are not in

session. Lawmakers adjourned in early June and don't reconvene until January.

But Parkinson said he didn't plan to react hastily to the news.

"We knew there would be good months and bad months as we work our way out of this recession," Parkinson said in a written statement. "It is too early to panic, and too soon to make rushed decisions. We will continue to monitor revenues closely over the coming weeks and months."

Final revenue numbers, compiled by legislative researchers, won't be released for several days as officials adjust totals to account for various transfers and other items, such as interest earned on various accounts. But the final figures usually follow the same trend

as the preliminary ones.

The Department of Revenue's report showed the biggest shortfalls in corporate and individual income taxes, which fell a combined \$75 million below estimates.

But the state did see better-than-forecast collections from sales taxes on big-ticket items bought outside Kansas, such as business equipment and personal vehicles. The bulge was about \$4.4 million.

Vehicle sales received a boost in late August because of a federal rebate program, known as "Cash for Clunkers," that encouraged residents to replace old ones with more fuel-efficient models. Researchers then anticipated a corresponding bump in revenues.
