



### **Bidding Quiz**

1. Pass. Whether or not to make an overcall is based more on the number of tricks you expect to take than on point count. Thus, a hand such as S 832 H A74 D KQJ106 C 53, with only 10 highcard points, is a much safer one-diamond bid than the 12-point hand in question. The usual test for an overcall is its safety - that is, how badly you can be hurt if the opponents double you for penalties.

2. Double. Your hand is a bit too strong to bid one heart. Suit overcalls on the one-level are often based on values that would not justify an opening bid, and this hand rates not only as an opening bid but as a very good one. Your plan is to bid hearts next over partner's response to the double, thereby identifying a hand too strong for an ordinary overcall at your first turn. A one-heart bid would be proper if, say, the ace of spades were the deuce.


3. One notrump. Here you can best describe your hand by bidding one notrump – the same bid you would have made had you been the opening bidder – rather than by doubling. A double would imply shortness in the opponent's suit and suggest a desire for suit play, which is not the message you wish to convey.

4. Double. The idea here is the same as in problem No. 2, where your hand is far too strong for a simiple overcall. At your next turn, you plan to jump in spades to let partner know you have a powerful hand that does not need much to make 5. Five diamonds. This won't necessarily prove

to be the winning bid – the best contract might even be three notrump. But there is too great a danger that the enemy can make a game in spades or hearts, and a tactical leap to five diamonds will work out best in the long run. The bid serves as both a defensive and offensive action at the same time.
