Domestic violence is a problem that often remains quiet for far too long, with devastating results. The hu-

man cost is staggering. According to the Kansas Bureau of Investigation, 19 adults and 14 children lost their lives in domestic violence homicides in Kansas in 2008.

In both rural and urban areas, many Kansans are victims of domestic violence. It is a problem that law enforcement, prosecutors and court service personnel are responding to regularly. These tragedies must be stopped.

The criminal justice response is critical for both victims' safety and perpetrator accountability. Victims must be provided protection and given the support necessary to improve their circumstances. And perpetrators must be held accountable for their violence and be given penalties that require changes in their behavior.
