Paul's conversion just the start Deaths

In this fourth part of a series on the life of Apostle Paul, we will look at Paul's life from his conversion experience until God called him as a missionary.

When a person has been suddenly converted to Christianity as Paul was, many times he will have a strong impulse to make known what has happened to him. Whether Paul yielded at once to this impulse or not, we do not know. In Acts, it is said, "Straightway he preached Christ in the synagogue." This verse would lead us to think so.

But we also learn from his writings that there was another powerful impulse influencing him at the same time; it is not clear which of the two he obeyed first. That was the desire to withdraw and think over the meaning of what had happened to him.

Paul had believed that destroying the Christian faith and persecuting Christians was what God wanted him to do. But on the Damascus road, when the voice called out to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" and he asked the question, "Who are you, Lord?" and the voice said, "I am Jesus whom you are persecuting" (Acts 9:4-5); these words must have devastated Paul. And they changed his life forever.


His former belief system was suddenly shattered, and he was severely shaken. This new truth came upon him as a flash of light, and he could not understand it all at one time. Paul was a born thinker. It was not enough for him just to experience something; he had to comprehend it and fit it into his beliefs and convictions. Immediately, after his conversion, therefore, he tells us that he withdraws into Arabia.

This is probably in Arabia where the Hebrews spent 40 years wandering, the place of Mount Sinai where Moses received the 10 Commandments, where manna was given to the Hebrews, and where Elijah spent some time.

It was a great place for Paul to meditate and pray; in this place the Holy Spirit helped him understand the gospel, and along with his knowledge of scriptures, he worked out his theology. It formed the gospel that he preached for the rest of his life.

In addition to this period of reflection, in 2 Corinthians 12:1-5, Paul writes that God honored him by taking him into the third heaven. (In Jewish theology, the first



heaven is where the clouds are, the second heaven is where the moon, sun, and stars are, and the third heaven is where God dwells.)

Here he received spiritual revelation of divine truth. This revelation happened at this time in Paul's life, but no one knows exactly when. All of these experiences gave Paul a profound understanding of the plan of God. Paul wrote in Galatians 1:11-12: "But I make known to you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached by me is not according to man. For I neither received it from man, nor was I taught it, but it came through the revelation of Jesus Christ."

His stay in Arabia lasted a year, perhaps more, because between his conversion and leaving Damascus and his return to Damascus was a three-year period, at least one year of which was spent in Arabia.

Upon returning to Damascus, Paul began preaching but was immediately forced to leave because of the Jews who thought he was a traitor to his faith.

Paul had been a leader in trying to destroy the Christian faith, but now he was preaching Christ. In Acts 9:22-25, Luke relates how Paul escaped from Damascus: he was let down through a window in the city wall in a basket. He then went to Jerusalem and tried to preach there, but the Jews thought he was a traitor and the Christians did not trust him.

Paul was now in possession of the gospel and aware that his life's mission was to preach it. But he still had a long wait before doing so. While the Christians distrusted Paul in Jerusalem, a man by the name of Barnabas heard his story, believed him, and finally per-



suaded the rest of the Christians to receive him. This only lasted a week or two because they feared Paul would be killed, so Paul left Jerusalem and went to his home town of Tarsus. Please read Acts 9:23-30.

But Barnabas had a profound impression of Paul and did not forget him. Paul stayed in Tarsus seven or eight years. We don't hear much about Paul in those years. There is some indication that he preached in the Tarsus area and witnessed to his own family.

During this period, Gentiles began receiving Christ (Acts 10). Persecution continued against the Christians, and so they were scattered.

One place they went was a city called Antioch, and a church was started there. The news of this new church reached the church in Jerusalem, and the church in Jerusalem sent Barnabas to Antioch to find out how they were faring.

Upon arriving in Antioch, Barnabas saw it was a true church which needed help, and it occurred to him that Paul was the man who was needed.

Tarsus was not far off, and so Barnabas went to find Paul and invited him to return to Antioch with him and Paul accepted (Acts 11:19-26). Next time, we will look at what happens at Antioch as Paul begins his missionary work.


