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# Pool queries answered at town hall

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Colby citizens at a "town-hall" meeting Tuesday on a proposed sales tax increase had plenty of questions for the City Council and Kevin McElyea, an engineer for Aquatic Design Consultants:

Where would it be? What would it cost? How big? What features? How much would it cost to get in? How many lifeguards would it need? How much for the land? And why a sales tax?

The \$5 million pool and water park will be built if voters approve a three-fourths-of-a-cent sales tax increase in a special elections Tuesday. Voters will be asked whether to levy the tax in the city for 10 years beginning April 1 to pay off the city's new fire station and a pool.

Several members of the compool and hiring Aquatic Design Consultants were on hand at the meeting, in the Little Theater at the Community Building. The committee includes city Manager Carolyn Armstrong, councilmen Tim Hutfles, Jim Brown and Patrick Mallory and several citizens. Maybe the biggest question left

unanswered was "where?" ۲ Mallory said the council hasn't

decided where to build the pool, but they are looking at several places, including east of the Colby Recreation Complex, north or south or east of Colby High School Franklin north of downtown.

could get to by riding a bike. Armstrong said the pool has always been "the best baby-sitting service in town."

McElyea said the pool would require more lifeguards and the operating budget would be 50 to 75 percent more than the one for today's pool.

McElyea gave a computer presentation that showed what the proposed aquatics center would look like. The sketch included a 25-meter, six-lane competition pool with floatable objects kids could climb on, low and high diving boards and a separate recreation pool with zero-depth entry (no stairs or ladder needed), "lazy river" float area, four а slides (toddler, family, inner tube and speed), a spray/play area for younger kids, and a floatable obstacle course.

The new pool also will have heated water (a problem with the mittee involved in lobbying for a old pool), several shady areas and a group rental area where people could pay to have a party. McElyea said with prices down, this was a great time to build a pool in terms of costs.

McElyea said the 25-meter pool could be used for the swim club events, swim lessons, aquatic aerobics classes, and for people who just want to swim laps. He said bleachers would be built around the pool so people attending meets would have somewhere to sit. Ask about fees, he said he'd

## Salon, foundation join for breast cancer benefit

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Uptown Style and Saloon teamed up Monday with a new group, the Northwest Kansas Foundation for Hope, to raise money for people with breast cancer.

Everything Uptown made from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday went to the foundation's wig fund, said Melinda Cheney, co-owner and massage therapist. The fund will allow the organization to buy wigs for people who have chemotherapy, who often lose their hair.

Uptown offered haircuts, maintenance and polish manicures for the discount price of \$10 on Monday. The costs normally ranges from \$15 to \$20, Cheney said

They raised about \$500, she said, and the business also joined other companies and citizens to sponsor a silent auction organized by the Lady Trojans' volleyball team from Colby Community College

The foundation has been organizing for the past six or seven months, said coordinator Pat Sloan of Homeland Realty. It plans to help people with cancer in the nine counties of northwest Kansas.

Sloan said the group is raising money so people with cancer can pay for things like wigs, medicine, hotels and fuel. She said the money each person gets will depend on what they need.

Kami Booi said several people in the group had worked with the American Cancer Society in the past before they decided to form a separate group. She said they wanted to make sure 100 percent of the money they raise would stay here in north-
