# Fort Hays president warns of cuts

Although there's light at the end of the economic tunnel, many more budget cuts may be in store for Kansas higher education. If that happens, says Fort Hays State University President Ed Hammond, the state's universities will have to make some serious cuts.

Hammond stopped by the Colby Free Press on Tuesday in the middle of a 40-stop tour of 16 Kansas towns. The president said he's been attending alumni events, and Rotary Club meetings and giving interviews at newspapers and radio stations, talking about the need to continue state spending for higher education.

Hammond said that in his discussions with people around the state, Kansans are beginning to see signs of improvement in the cerned over budget cuts and enrollment for the state's colleges.

its financial support of the universities, Hammond said. This year for the first time, he said, more money is coming in from tuition than from state aid. In the budget crunch this year the state made a 12 percent cut to its higher education budget.

"If we continue to cut, we aren't going to be able to continue providing services at the same level," Hammond said.

Fort Hays is one of the major destinations for Thomas County's college-bound youth, he noted, with 48 students from the county on campus and 23 online students. Hammond said Colby Community College is the second-largest feeder into Fort Hays State, after Barton County Community College in Great Bend.

Fort Hays itself is in a pretty good spot to ride out the lean times, he said. Hammond pointed to the university's recent growth as economy, but they remain con- one of the ways it has weathered the recession. Enrollment in the
