

Get garden soil ready for new year

A few hours spent in your yard and garden right now will pay off in a big way next spring. It's time to put things to bed for the winter, and the time you spend will have a direct relationship to the kind of garden production you can expect to enjoy next season.

Indeed, autumn offers a wide range of gardening opportunities, including a few jobs that I have talked about the past few weeks. I honestly believe the most important task you can undertake right now is to spread a thick layer of leaves on the surface of your garden plot and then plow them in as deeply as you possibly can.

Your reward will be an extremely superior, soft, tillable, rich seedbed next spring. When you plow the plot next spring, you'll not find any of the leaves you plowed in – they will all have biodegraded into the soil, providing food for earthworms and giving the soil a bit of nourishment and lots of tilth.

Leaves aren't the only good soil additive right now, but certainly the one that will break down most quickly. A couple of inches of grass clippings, a layer of semirotten hay or straw or a couple of inches of horse, cattle or chicken manure, all plowed into the soil, will provide you with a head start to gardening success next spring.

If you have maintained a compost pile this year, now is the time to remove those materials, spread them on the surface of the garden and plow them deeply into the soil. The natural freezing and thawing of the soil during the months of December, January, February and March will assure you that all those materials will decay and give your soil sustenance for healthy growing things next season.

It's a simple process. As I point out in my book, Chapter 1, it's all about the soil, not the weeding process, not the proper addition of moisture, not the choice of seeds. It's the soil, plain and simple. All other practices considered, if your garden soil is in good shape, you will raise a crop.

I hope you will do what you can to prepare your soil for next year's plantings. It all begins now. I send out these admonishments today as I leave you for the season. Thank you all for your kind comments during the past 38 weeks.

Speaking of my book, I remind you that it seems to be a popular item when given as a gift. "The Gardener's Common Sense Guide to Vegetable Gardening in the Midwest" is available now at the Prairie Museum Gift Shop in Colby, Donna's Gift Shop in St. Francis, Ward Drug in Oberlin, the Craft Peddler in Brewster, in Goodland at Jacque's Hallmark, Elliott Furniture and Prairie Rose Floral, and Williams Floral and Garden in Burlington. Or just call me at (785) 899-3513.

And now go out there and plant a few tulip bulbs. Buy a large bulb of garlic - break loose the cloves individually, dig a three-inch deep furrow in the garden, plant the cloves about three inches apart, sprinkle in a little bone meal, cover with soil and tamp lightly. This will be your first "green" of the new season as the garlic begins to emerge in February.
