





A trap crop absorbs nitrogen from the soil, said Dave Mengel, soil fertility specialist with Kansas State University Research and Extension. Unless the crop is then is blocked from moving through grazed or harvested, however, the the soil to contaminate groundwanitrogen will remain, preserved within the residue for use by future crops.

This helps reduce soil nitrogen losses between cash crops, he said, due to either leaching or denitrification, a natural process by which bacteria convert nitrates into nitrogen gas.

Fast-growing, nitrogen-demanding crops are ideal as trap crops, Mengel said. Good choices include millet or forage sorghum, planted in summer after winter wheat. Others choices are cereal rye, wheat, triticale or canola, planted in fall after summer crops.

"Keep in mind that trap crops use the soil nitrogen they take up to support their own growth,"
