The Colby High season came to an end on last week as the Eagles got whipped by Buehler High, 64-19. The combination of a fast running back and a group of massive linemen was too much for the Eagles, but the Crusaders are one of the best football teams in Class 4A, and the team has no reason to hang their heads about the loss.

Besides, one playoff game shouldn't take away from a successful season.

The Eagles went 7-3 this year, taking third in the Northwest Kansas League. If a couple of plays had gone differently, the Eagles may have ended up 9-1. Still, Colby's record represents an improvement from the previous season, when the team finished 6-4. If this trend continues, the Eagles should be 8-2 next season.

Kaus ended up taking 27th place with a time of 16 minutes, 46 seconds. It was a disappointing time for the Lady Eagles' runner, who went into the season with the goal of finishing in the top 10 at state.
