A Colby nursing home that was put on notice by the Kansas Department of Aging passed a second inspection and will not be closing, officials say.

The state agency had issued a public notice on Nov. 2 that it was closing the Care Center to Medicare and Medicaid patients because it was not in "substantial compliance" with state and federal regulations. The center had until Nov. 29 to fix the issues, however, and Halling said, a follow-up survey had already been scheduled for last Tuesday.

## Kansas legislators can't escape debate over drive to raise taxes

TOPEKA — A debate over raising taxes appears inevitable for Kansas legislators next year because of the state's continuing budget problems.

The conversation appears most likely to focus first on eliminating exemptions to the state's 5.3 percent sales tax, then on rolling back tax breaks legislators granted to businesses in previous years, but it's possible the scope could broaden further.

The Republican-controlled Legislature will reconvene in January after a year of spending cuts and other adjustments to keep the budget balanced. Democratic Gov. Mark Parkinson is promising to make nearly \$260 million in cuts by the end of this month to prevent a deficit for the fiscal year ending

However, legislators will have to approve a budget for the next fiscal year, and they're already having to close a projected shortfall for that year, fiscal 2011. Even lawmakers who strongly oppose tax increases — and question whether revenue-raising measures could pass — don't believe the debate can be avoided.

"I think you're going to have to have the discussion," said Senate Ways and Means Committee Chairman Jay Emler, a Lindsborg Republican.

Four previous rounds of cuts and other adjustments this year have left the state with a current (fiscal 2010) budget that includes \$5.6 billion in spending financed with the state's general tax revenues.

But state officials issued a new financial forecast last week that projected state revenues at only \$5.4 billion, prompting Parkinson's fifth round of cuts. Furthermore, the same officials predicted the state's total general revenues would drop to less than \$5.2 billion in the next fiscal year.

Federal stimulus dollars have buffered some of the state's woes, but even with help from Washington, the state faces trimming aid to public schools and reducing spending again in other parts of the budget.

Educators are one obvious potential source of pressure on legislators to raise new tax dollars. Aid to public schools consumes a little more than half the state's general revenues. The state has backed away from commitments it made only three years ago under pressure from the Kansas Supreme Court -
