Health and Environment is encouraging people to quit smoking as part of the 34th Annual American Cancer Society Great American Smokeout on Thursday.



A person who smokes a pack a day spends approximately \$35 per week on cigarettes, \$150 a month and more than \$18,000 during 10 years. Smokers can calculate individual costs by visiting www. kdheks.gov/tobacco and selecting

The Kansas Department of the American Cancer Society's Tobacco Calculator. When Kansans are ready to quit

smoking, the Kansas Tobacco Quitline (800) QUIT-NOW (784-8669) is ready to help. The Quitline is a no cost service available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. A counselor works with the caller to prepare for a quit date and create a plan to fight cravings. Follow-up calls are arranged around participants' schedules. Studies find that using a Quitline can more than double a person's chances of successfully quitting tobacco.


