Two books that help us appreciate the true Thanksgiving story are "America's Hidden History: Untold Tales of the First Pilgrims, Fighting Women and Forgotten Founders Who Shaped A Nation,' by Kenneth C. Davis, and "Mayflower: A Story of Courage, Community and War," by Nathaniel Philbrick.

These books really help us consider some of the sacrifices and decisions that real people made when hardship was their compan-

The amazing thing about hardship and sacrifices is that they can make us appreciate what we have, and become stronger and more able to serve others. I remember a very sparse Thanksgiving growing up. My family had just moved to an easter state and we could not find a place to live around the holidays. So my mom cooked a turkey on the top of a stove in a small motel suite. That turkey tasted so good that year, I can still remem-

Another year of difficulty was when my sister was in the hospital and had just finished her first round of very intense chemotherapy. She had been working so hard to get better and be out of isolation and just wanted to go home for Thanksgiving. She set in her mind that she wanted us all there with her enjoying our holiday together, even if she could not eat. Well, we took her home on Tuesday with the proper medicines and care, but found she was just too sick to stay.

We made it through the night, but called the hospital to return her on Wednesday. I spent the day calling family and friends to say that we'd be at the hospital, and to come there to visit on Thanksgiv-

Thanksgiving, family, friends and church members arrived with guitars, communion, prayers and precious visits. That year, we were thankful for a hospital staff that made a Thanksgiving dinner for patients, family members and staff.
