**ORDINANCE NO. 1463** 

AN ORDINANCE OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF COLBY, KANSAS, AUTHORIZING THE IMPOSITION OF A SPECIAL THREE-QUARTERS PERCENT (3/4%) CITYWIDE RETAILERS' SALES TAX AND RELATED MATTERS.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of K.S.A. 12-187 et seq.(the "Act"), the City of Colby, Kansas (the "City") is authorized to impose a local retailers' sales tax upon all retail sales within the boundaries of the City, except as specifically exempted by the

WHEREAS, the governing body of the

City (the "Governing Body") adopted Resoution No. 995 of the City on September 15, 2009, which resolution requested authorization to: (1) acquire a site for and construct and equip a new aquatic center and related appurtenances (the "Aquatic Center Project") and to issue the City's general obligation bonds pursuant to K.S.A. 12-1736 et seq., in an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 (the "Bonds") to provide for payment of the costs of the Aquatic Center Project, including interest costs during construction and associated issuance costs; and (2) impose a three-quarters percent (3/4%) city-wide retailers' special purpose sales tax pursuant to K.S.A. 12-187 et seq. (the "Sales Tax"), the proceeds of which shall be used only to: (a) finance all or a portion of the costs of the Aquatic Center Project, including payment of debt service on the Bonds, and the operating and maintenance costs thereof; (b) finance all or a portion of the costs of constructing the new fire station and related appurtenances thereto, including payment of debt service on the City's temporary notes or general obligation bonds issued to pay such costs, and (c) for the payment of such other governmental purposes as may be in the best interests of the City; the collection of such Sales Tax to commence on April 1, 2010, or as soon thereafter as permitted by law and shall terminate ten years after its com-

WHEREAS the question of the imposition of such Sales Tax was submitted to the electors of the City at a special question election on November 3, 2009, and at said election a majority of the qualified electors of the City voting on that proposition voted in favor thereof; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of the Act and the special question election, the Governing Body deems it necessary and advisable to authorize the imposition of the Sales Tax for the purposes described

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED

BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF COLBY, KANSAS

SECTION 1. Implementation of Sales Tax. The imposition of the Sales Tax and the application of the revenue received therefrom to finance all or a portion of the costs of the Aquatic Center Project, including payment of debt service on the Bonds and the operating and maintenance costs thereof; finance all or a portion of the costs of constructing the new fire station and related appurtenances thereto including payment of debt service on the City's temporary notes or general obligation bonds issued to pay such costs; and pay for such other governmental purposes as may be in the best interests of the City, is hereby authorized. Collection of the Sales Tax shall commence on April 1, 2010, in accordance with the Act, and shall terminate ten years

after its commencement.

SECTION 2. Authorization of Aquatic Center Project; Financing. struction of the Aquatic Center Project in accordance with plans and specifications therefore to be approved by the Governing Body are hereby authorized. A portion of the costs of the Aquatic Center Project including interest costs during construction and associated issuance costs, shall be payable from the proceeds of the Bonds in an amount not to exceed \$5,000,000. Pro ceeds from the Bonds issued by the City to finance the costs of the Aquatic Center Project and associated financing costs may be used to reimburse expenditures made on or after the date that is 60 days before the date of passage of this Ordinance pursuant to U.S. Treasury Regulation § 1.150-2.

SECTION 3. Department of Revenue Submittal. The City Clerk shall provide a certified copy of this Ordinance to the State Director of Taxation pursuant to the provisions of the Act and request the imposition of the Sales Tax in accordance with the pro visions hereof.

SECTION 4. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be effective upon passage by the Governing Body, execution by the Mayor and publication once in the official City newspaper.




