

Sherman sheriff's office uncovers cock-fighting ring

rels behind the house.

Eric L. Sakach, a senior law enforcement specialist from the Humane Society of the United States from Sacramento, Calif., accompanied the searchers. During the briefing, he said it appeared from the aerial shot that the fighting cocks were in the barrels in the front yard. He said he expected to find hens and breeding roosters in the pens and barrels around the other sides of the house.

He told the officers who would go through the quonset to look for training paraphernalia and bottles of steroids and hormones used to encourage the birds to fight. He said the special knives used in cock fighting are illegal, adding that officers might find them hidden somewhere in the quonset.

He told the officers who were to identify and photograph each bird how to approach them and how to hold them for a good evidence photo. He said the officers should be wearing gloves and be careful, as the birds are raised to attack.

North of the trailer and bird area was another enclosed pen where pheasants are kept and raised for a nearby state-licenses controlled hunting area.

Wildlife Conservation Officer Mike Hopper, who covers Sherman, Cheyenne and Wallace counties for the state Department of Wildlife and Parks, spoke to

the officers about a type bird trap that might be found around the outside of the pens to capture hawks and other birds of prey. He said these traps may violates federal law and any evidence would be gathered and reported to federal wildlife people.

The property is owned by Henderson Partnership Ltd. of Galveston, Texas. Manager for the ranch is listed as Earl Petropolis. He demanded that Sheriff Kevin Butts order reporters off of private property. A reporter and cameraman from S&T Telephone were asked to leave, as was a reporter for The Goodland Star-News.

About 10 officers from the sheriff's department, including Sheriff Butts, Undersheriff Roger Studer and Deputy Showalter, were part of the arrest and search party. Also along were about five officers from the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, including Hopper; two men from the Kansas Animal Health office and one from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Sakach of the Humane Society, two state troopers and Detective Dean Ohman and his son from Douglas County, where a similar case was broken in recent weeks.

Sheriff Butts said it took all day to process the scene. He said searchers found some of the birds to be very feisty, including one that tore through a pair of welding gloves.

Goodland store owner arrested with four others for lottery fraud

more than \$25,000 was among five people arrested in an undercover sting by state lottery agents and the attorney general's office, state officials said Monday.

Sherman County Attorney Bonnie Selby said a man from the attorney general's office called last week and said they were sending charges out to be filed in District Court against Cheryl Krentz, 49, of Goodland, owner of Cowboy

Court records show the complaint and warrant were filed on Nov. 16, and served on Krentz on Nov. 17. She is free on \$2,500 bond, with a first appearance scheduled for 10 a.m. on Dec. 15.

Krentz is charged with computer crime, which is a level 8 nonperson felony, and attempted theft by deception a level 9 nonperson felony.

The complaint says Paul Schliffke, an agent from the state lottery, allegedly presented a win-

> Kansas Attorney General Steve Six and Lottery executive director Ed Van Petten said five of six people snared in the probe had been arrested. A sixth case was still under review.

> The attorney general's office filed charges against Krent; Justin Bright, 27, of Hutchinson; Reza Ahmed, 29, of Bel Aire; Daniel Kerr, 26 of Wichita;, and Baldhir Sood, 52, of Shawnee. The remaining suspect is from Liberal.

> "This undercover operation was conducted to ensure Kansans who play the lottery receive the winnings they are due," Six said during a news conference in Topeka.

Van Petten said the investigation included 196 retailers, and was the broadest in the state agency's history. There are 1,800 retailers associated with the Kansas Lottery.

were terminated, Van Petten said.

The three employees of the other retailers were fired by their employers, he said.

The sting began when agents presented unsigned winning lottery tickets to retailers. The clerks are required to advise customers they had won a prize and instruct each they had to redeem winnings at lottery headquarters. In six instances, the clerks withheld information about the winning ticket, but later tried to redeem the prize personally or with help of an accomplice.

Van Petten said by trying to collect on the tickets, the suspects of this fraud delivered themselves and evidence of their misconduct to investigators. We are pleased the vast major-

ity of retailers and clerks did the right thing," Van Petten said. "We again remind our players to always sign the back of their tickets
