# What will you resolve?



How different this is from what Paul writes to the church in Corinth: "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" (2 Cor. 5:17, NRSV)

The joy of this promise is that we don't have to do anything. We don't have to make resolutions, kept or forgotten. God, in Christ, does all the work for us. We become new creations through Christ's grace, and his grace alone. No amount of New Year's resolutions can change us so profoundly, nor so permanently, as the new life we receive in Christ.

The hard part is believing and accepting such a gracious gift. Our rational, human self tells us we have to work hard, struggle, earn everything - and here God is, giving us this hope of being a new creation in Christ for nothing.

#### but God still gives it to us. We keep breaking all our well-intended resolutions, yet in Christ we remain new. Not very logical, but whoever said God was confined to human logic anyway?

We are a new creation Christmas. We have just finished celebrating the birth of Jesus, giving thanks for Emmanuel, God with us.

Through Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection we are made new. He is God's Christmas present/ presence for us.

It seems to me that the best thing we can do as we prepare to enter a New Year is to accept this gift and invite and allow the present/presence of Jesus to work in our lives, to let the Holy Spirit lead us into living more fully as the new creatures God has made us in Christ.

How you accept this gift is up to you. Go to church more - or start going - pray, read scripture, live as if you truly were the new creation Christ has already gifted you to be. Feel the freedom of being liberated from your sins, give thanks in all things, love God, others and even yourselves with a bit more abandonment and joy.

God has already resolved that in Christ we are new creations. Now that's a resolution worth keeping. May you know God's blessings in 2010. The joy, love and peace of being new creations in Christ be with you in this new year.




