One of Joe's sons, Frank, the grandfather of Henry Bremenkamp Jr., purchased the NW 1/4 of 28-8-32 for \$10 an acre in 1904, and made it his permanent home. The family lived in a three-room "soddy" until they built a two-story house in 1909, the house Henry Jr. lives in today.

The younger Henry recalls that when he was a boy, he watched his mother help his father onto the tractor. He also remembers watching while a neighbor, Lon Sowers, would carry his dad to the tractor and set him on it.

"My dad would use his hands to position whichever leg he needed to work the clutch and brake on the tractor," Bremenkamp said. "To get Dad onto the combine, we built a seat out of steel posts and attached it to the side of the truck. We would get Dad into the fertile rolling plains of Thomas seat and then raise the box on the County.

To help him get his first start in farming, Henry Jr. said, his dad let him farm a rented quarter, and in the late 1970s he purchased 80 acres of the quarter he was born on. Today he owns 100 acres of Henry inherited the land with it, with his sisters sharing in the other 60. He has since purchased and corn.
