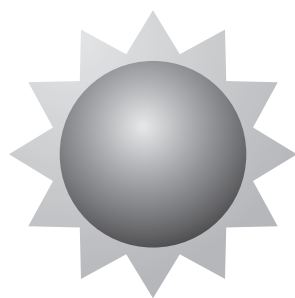


Weather Corner

Besides having wings in five flavors – super hot, hot, barbecue, lemon pepper and teryaki – she will be serving deep-fried Snickers bars and deep fried Oreos cookies.
 For lunch, she said, you can have five wings, fries and a drink for \$5, or a choice of sandwiches and wraps, plus a choice of desserts.
 After working on the place for three months, passing all the inspections, and a test run on Thursday, she said, she is ready.
 Dewey said she will offer take out or dine in. The restaurant has

two seating areas: The loft has seating for 18 with two big plasma televisions, and the main floor has seating for 12. She said people are welcome to come and watch the Super Bowl and eat wings. She has her beer license and they can have a brew with their wings if they want.
 Dewey's son Doug will be head cook, and three other family members will be helping with the preparation and ordering.
 Hours will be from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and 5 to 10 p.m. at 2265 Taylor Ave., west of K-25 just south of Interstate 70. The phone is (785) 460-0186.

able to do business in a single stop, and it greatly improved our services," Maxwell said. "This past year, we have enjoyed a 10 percent growth."
 Although the main office is in Colby, Maxwell said, they have seven outpost locations around the area that they man once and sometimes twice a week. Only Logan County is without a presence.
 He said the bank is a cooperative, and has no connection to the government owned by its members, except for federal banking rules. Farm Credit Services, Maxwell said, is the largest bank in northwest Kansas, with a loan volume of \$250 million.
 "We are structured so that as we build capital," he said, "we share the profits through a cash patronage with the customers, and over the past 10 years, have paid out right at \$13 million."

The firm has 24 employees, including Randy Wilson, senior vice president of credit; Mark Winger Sr., vice president of administration, and Vern Roemer Sr., vice president of operations, who round out the management team.

Norton girl safe after quake

begin walking there. He wasn't sure when they would be flown back to the U.S., but was working on getting a private aircraft to pick them up.
 Joan Streck, Naomi's mother, said she hasn't spoken to her daughter since before the earthquake, although she received two e-mails. Naomi e-mailed her parents when she arrived but was able to send another e-mail shortly before the quake.
 Streck said the orphanage has 95 children this year.
 "There are so many more tiny babies this time," Naomi said in her e-mail.
 She asked her parents to pray for safe travels.
 Streck said it amazed her the students had been able to send a second e-mail, at 2:30 p.m. Central Time, half an hour before the earthquake hit.
 "Up until that time, they must not have felt any tremors or had any kind of warning signs," Streck said.
 Streck remembered how Nao-

mi described the orphanage last year, saying the team helped take care of the children and do maintenance work.
 She said the children receive two meals of beans and corn each day, but had no toys.
 "She was amazed at how little the children have," she said.
 Streck said Naomi came home with a goal of getting toys, and other things for the kids. Immanuel Lutheran Church of Norton did a mission project during vacation Bible school last summer, collecting new and used toys as well as clothes, shoes and purses for the orphanage. Naomi was able to drop them off with Reimer, who told her they were shipped to the orphanage in July.
 Naomi told her parents her favorite time in Haiti was evening devotional, when the children would gather to sing Christian songs and read bible verses. She told her mother about a night when five children piled onto her lap for devotion.
 Naomi's mother also described the church at the orphan-

age. The kids share clothing but have one nice outfit. Naomi said the kids all wanted to wear their nice clothes to go to church or to climb up a mountain to a small structure made out of sticks.
 "She learned you can praise God anywhere, in any setting and it can be meaningful," Streck said.
 The Streckes have seen and heard a lot of concern for the mission team from people in town.
 "We want to thank all of our friends and family who have been praying for Naomi, her group and the orphans. We ask you continue to pray that God's will be done, and through this catastrophic event they feel His love," Streck said.
 Streck said Naomi had been touched by the kids at the orphanage last year and will be again this year.
 "I wouldn't be surprised if she went again."
