Gabel made it clear that he did not want to reduce coaches' salaries to add new positions. It would be strictly volunteer, he said, and decided on a case by case basis. The board approved the first one, taking \$300 from middle school wrestling coach Troy Rall's

salary to pay for assistant coach Hunter Olsen.

Harrison said she would also like to have more tors will speak to any organization that wants more information on the budget crisis, she said, adding that she has already spoken to many organizations such as the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs.

"We have to get the attention of our community," Harrison said. "We have to let them know how bad this is. This is going to affect us drastically."


