## Colby boys beat main rival

After dropping their first game in the 25th annual Paul Wintz/ Tom Bowen Orange and Black Basketball Classic, the Colby High Eagles split their last two

tournament games. The boys overcame a five-point halftime deficit and beat rival Goodland 51-48 on Saturday but couldn't get over a bad first quarter Friday and lost to Scott City

Colby's win over Goodland snapped a three-game losing streak. The Eagles got off to a strong start against the Cowboys. Senior Ryley Haas knocked down a three-pointer and senior Chaz Winger scored on a tough drive to the basket to give Colby an early 5-0 advantage. The Eagles' offense stagnated after that, however, and the pendulum swung in the direction of the Cowboys.

Rvan Hillmer of Goodland drilled a three-pointer and scored on a tough drive to help give the Cowboys a 9-5 lead at the end of the first quarter.

The Cowboys extended their lead to 13-5 before Colby junior Corbin Stephens buried a threepointer to cut the lead to 13-8. Later, Stephens was double-teamed at the top of the key but still managed to find junior Spencer Tubbs near the basket for a layup.

Tubbs was active on defense, blocking several shots in the first half. Stephens hit a pretty fallaway jumper off the backboard to cut the Cowboys' lead to 17-12. Colby trailed 23-18 at halftime.

Hillmer hit a three pointer to extend Goodland's lead to 26-18 early in the third. The Cowboys extended their lead to 28-18 before Stephens drilled a jumper from the right baseline to make it 28-20. Later on, senior Braden McKee, coach John McKee's son, entered the game for the first time and nailed a jumper to cut Goodland's lead to 28-25. Coach Mc-Kee said Braden sat out the first half to rest a right knee he injured earlier in the season.

Stephens drilled a midrange jumper to narrow the gap to 32-30 with 3:15 left in the third. Winger escaped with the ball during a scuffle on defense. He passed it to Haas, who pushed the ball downcourt before firing a pass to Tubbs for a layup to tie the game at 32. Braden McKee scored to give Colby a 34-32 lead with 2:12 left in the third. Then Winger got a rebound and stuck it back in to give the Eagles a four-point lead.

The Cowboys scored the first five points of the fourth to take a 37-36 lead. Winger rebounded a Haas miss and laid it in to recap-

nailed a three-pointer to extend Colby's lead to 41-37. Later on, Winger was able to split two defenders and make a layup to put Colby out in front 45-38. Winger was all over the place on both ends of the court in the fourth quarter.

"It was his best games overall," said coach McKee.

McKee complimented Winger for guarding Hillmer tough in the fourth. Braden McKee hit a cutting Winger, who laid it over the rim to give Colby a 47-38 lead. Goodland came storming back in the fourth, though, trimming the Eagles' lead to 47-46.

Stephens traveled while being pressured in the backcourt with 1:11 left. The Cowboys were unable to score on offense and Braden McKee pulled down the rebound. But one of Goodland's player grabbed the ball, forcing a tie-up.

The possession arrow was in Goodland's favor. Stephens ripped the ball away from the person he was guarding, then got fouled. He hit both his free throws to give Colby a 49-46 lead. The Cowboys' Kevin Amfor scored inside after managing to get away from his defender inside to cut Colby's lead back to 49-48. Stephens got to an errant pass by Haas and took it to the hoop for a layup with only a few seconds left to make the final score 51-48.

Winger scored a team-high 17 points and Stephens added 16. Haas had 8, Tubbs 6 and Braden McKee 4.


"Offensively, everyone was looking for each other more," said coach McKee.

Colby might have beaten Scott City if it wasn't for the slow first quarter. With Stephens and Winger sitting on the bench at the beginning of the game, the Beavers jumped out to a 20-0 lead.

Senior Brock Wagoner finally got Colby on the scoreboard near the end of the quarter when he scored inside.

Haas caught fire from behind the arc in the second quarter. He knocked down his first threeanother three to make it 29-15. The Beavers' Ron Baker drilled a three of his own to extend his

team's lead to 32-15. Later in the quarter, Haas buried a third three pointer with a hand right in his face to make it 34-22 Scott City. Haas ended up 4 for 7 from behind the arc. Later in the quarter, Haas got fouled while trying to score a transition layup. He buried both free throws to cut the Beavers' lead to 34-22. Haas said he had a hurt wrist going into the game, but he said he didn't let it bother him.
