Cheer squad member follows long-standing family tradition

W.D. McNeely V has many reasons to attend Colby Community College.

His grandfather, W.D. McNeely III, was the school's first chemistry instructor when the doors opened in 1964 at the Cooper Hotel in downtown Colby. In addition, his father W.D. McNeely IV and his mother Jill Fitzsimmons met in Colby while attending high school. His grandmothers, Maxine McNeely and Betty Fitzsimmons, are well-known in the community and encouraged him to come to Colby.

"My grandfather and grandmother McNeely moved to Colby to teach at the college," W.D. said. "When my grandfather died he was replaced by another wellknown teacher, Cyril Leiker. My grandfather and Roger Hale, who also taught during that time, were good friends. Roger is my godfather.

W.D. McNeely V graduated from Arapahoe High School in Littleton, Colo., in 2005. He attended a community college in Littleton for a brief time and then decided he wasn't ready for college.

"I worked at a variety of jobs during that time," said McNeely. "I did okay in high school but was more interested in ... sports and other activities. After a time I determined I wanted to go to college so I moved to Colby and lived with my grandmother Maxine." He started classes in January, 2009, and will graduate this May.

McNeely is a member of the Trojan cheer squad and chess club, a student senate representative, art club president, student ambassador and a peer tutor. He was also selected as a member of Phi Theta Kappa, the honor society for students attending community and two-year colleges.
