



Dear Heloise: When I lived in Germany, I learned to use a CHAMOIS to clean my windows. They can be found in the automotive section of most stores, and also in auto-parts stores. The ones available here have a lot of oils in them. They must be thoroughly washed with a good detergent and rinsed very well before being used on your windows.

I also use a gallon of warm water with about a half-cup of fabulous vinegar. There's no need to wipe one direction on one side of the glass and the other way on the other side because there will be NO streaks. I squeeze the chamois until it doesn't drip to clean the window, then wring the leather out until it is as dry as I can get it to dry the glass.





1. You are declarer with the West hand at Four Hearts, and North leads a trump. How would you play the hand? (Played correctly, the contract cannot be defeated regardless of how the North-South cards are divided.) East West **♦**Q74 **♥**KQJ963 ▲ A 10 6
♥ A 10 8 5 **♦** 10 ♦ 7 4 **♣**K 6 5 ♣AJ42 2. You are declarer with the West hand at Six Clubs, and North leads the two of hearts. You win with the queen and lead the four of trumps to dummy's queen, North following with the three and South the two. How would you continue? West East

Test Your Play

1. Draw the missing trumps, cash the K-A of clubs and, if the club jack is not yet a trick, lead a diamond. The defender who wins the diamond cannot return a spade or a club without establishing a 10th trick for you, so let's assume he leads another diamond. In that case, you discard your six of clubs!

Again the defender on lead cannot play a spade or a club without allowing you to make the contract, nor can he afford a diamond continuation, which would hand you a ruff-and-discard. You are certain to make 10 tricks whatever he returns, but note that at no point were you in danger of losing the contract.

2. The only real danger is the possibility of losing two trump tricks. This can occur only if the trumps are divided 4-1, so the question is how to guard against this eventuality.

If you were to cash dummy's ace of clubs at this point, you would go down if North started with the K-10-7-3. The best way to guard against this is to return to your hand by overtaking dummy's king of hearts with the ace and lead the nine of trumps.

If North produces the ten or king, you win with the ace and have the contract firmly in tow. If North produces the seven, you play low from dummy to assure the contract. At worst, you lose one trump trick by adopting this method of play.

Of course, North might show out when you lead the nine of trumps at trick four. This would occur if South, holding the K-10-7-2 originally, ducked dummy's queen of clubs at trick two. In that case, you can assure the slam by putting up the ace and returning the five toward your J-8-6. (c)2010 King Features Syndicate Inc.
