Bonemeal isn't the organic the only way to know whether fertilizer that it used to be, and that's proving to be an unhappy surprise for those who learned to garden at Grandma's knee.

"It's still made from steamed, ground-up bones – typically from beef animals. But, today's processing methods are so efficient that they remove most of the nutrients. You can't count on bonemeal any more as a lowrisk, complete fertilizer source," said Ward Upham, horticulturist with Kansas State University Research and Extension.

Modern bonemeal remains a good source of phosphorus (P). That nutrient helps plants perform well on the cell level and said. So, experts now tend to recommend bonemeal as one part of a balanced fertilizer program for bulbs, roses and other rels, chipmunks and/or moles. plants that could use a slow-release form of phosphorus.

natural phosphorus - unless skunks and other meat-eating or they've been continuously farmed for years. A soil test is

applying more could benefit plants.

"Overdosing soil with phosphorus continues to promote root growth. At the same time, however, it interferes with the relationship that roots normally have with a particular kind of soil fungi - what's called a mycorrhizal relationship," the horticulturist said.

The result is plant stress. Without the fungi's help, roots have to work much, much harder. And, "they can need some luck, too, to take up enough water and nutrients to support plant health," he said.

Some gardeners believe a promotes root growth, Upham sprinkling of any animal-based, organic fertilizer - bonemeal, blood meal, fish meal, etc. can deter problem deer, squir-Upham warned, however, that organics' smell can attract But, soils typically contain dogs, cats, raccoons, opossums, omnivorous critters.
