


Weather Corner

Candidate brings plan to Colby

Besides health care, the Mann Plan also covers government spending. Mann said the government has doubled in size in past 10 years and is \$12 trillion in debt. The plan proposes that the government stop spending money on bailouts and stimulus packages and reform the "earmark" process, where members of Congress add special projects to unrelated bills, to get rid of unnecessary spending.

"The government can't afford to pay for every member of Congress' pet project," he said.

One thing that might help people better understand the federal budget, he said, is if politicians started talking in dollars per American, rather than in large abstract numbers. For example, he said, \$1 trillion would equal \$3,300 per American.

Mann said he has been talking up the plan to people around the district, and so far he has gotten a good response.

Mann faces stiff competition in the crowded 1st District race, but he said he feels he is one of the "top-tier" candidates.

Mann was born on a farm near Quinter, which he said his family has owned for generations and still owns today. He attended Kansas State University, where he was student body president.

Mann said it was the few months he spent interning for outgoing Rep. Jerry Moran in his Washington office that kindled his interest in politics. He spent another two years working for the National Student Leadership Forum on Faith and Values, which helps plan "faith-based" leadership programs for college students.

Mann said he focuses on industrial real estate.

"That allows me to get under the hood and look at a lot of businesses," he said.

Mann said he believes we need more businessmen in Congress. Basic business concepts like a balanced budget and avoiding large debt seem to have been lost, he said. The candidate said his own background in agriculture and business makes him ideally suited to represent the 1st District.

"Ag is the backbone of the 1st," he said.

If elected, he said his main goal would be to get on the House Agriculture Committee and eventually become chairman.

"Ag supported my family for generations," he said. "I want to do my part to support it."

Primary elections are Tuesday, Aug. 3, and the general election is Tuesday, Nov. 2.

hookups at the fairgrounds are cheaper than he is.

"We're charging the same price for the three basics of electricity, sewer and water," said chairman Ken Christiansen. "Dan said he charges \$390 a month with every seventh day a free day, and he offers showers and laundry facilities, and his facility is advertised. We charge \$360 a month with no free days, we do not have showers or laundry facilities, and don't advertise."

"Then as long as the fair board sets their rate and follows it, I see no problem," said Commissioner Paul Steele.

Commissioner Byron Sowers said it looks like they are not comparing apples to apples.

"As long as the sewer, water, and electricity are the same," he said, "and the county doesn't advertise its hookups, and they don't offer showers and laundry facilities, then I don't see any problem."

The commissioners said they would stay the course and let the fair board take care of situations as long as they are being reasonable.

Fair board member Claire Schrock told the commissioners they had been asked about in-

surance for the fireworks stand, and the answer is, "Yes, we do require insurance, and the person who rents the building has a \$1 million liability policy."

He said the board requires insurance of everyone who uses the grounds.

In other business:

- County Appraiser Mary Cech asked commissioners for permission to hire an expert to help with an appraisal that is headed for the state Court of Tax Appeals. The appeal stems from a property owner, Sunflower Partners Inc., which paid 2009 taxes under protest on the Quality Inn in Colby. Cech said the bill was for \$23,000. Cost of the service is expected to be \$6,000 or less, she said. The commissioners told her to go ahead.

- Mr. Patrick met with commissioners about cleaning issues at the office complex. His suggestion was that each department leave a list for the cleaning personnel as to what all they wanted cleaned, because each office is different.

The commissioners agreed, saying that should serve to solve a small problem before it became a big one.

- Commissioners appointed Dr. Brewster Kellogg as county health officer and inmate physician.

Killer of Wichita abortion doctor sentenced to 'hard 50' life in prison

WICHITA — A man who murdered one of the few U.S. doctors who performed late-term abortions used his sentencing hearing as a forum to espouse his views in an effort to justify his crime, arguing that he had chosen to obey "God's law" to save babies.

Scott Roeder was sentenced Thursday to life in prison with no possibility of parole for 50 years, the longest sentence possible under Kansas law for first-degree murder. The 52-year-old Kansas City, Mo., man killed Dr. George Tiller as he was serving as an usher last May in the foyer of the doctor's church in Wichita.

"I stopped him so he could not dismember another innocent baby," Roeder said. "Wichita is a far safer place for unborn babies without George Tiller."

Roeder also was sentenced to an additional year in prison on each of two counts of aggravated as-

sault for threatening two church ushers as he fled. With time off for good behavior, he won't be eligible for parole for 51 years and eight months.

An attorney, speaking in court as a friend of the slain doctor, said the toughest sentence would discourage other anti-abortion zealots from attacking doctors. Tiller's widow, Jeanne, cried as the sentence for murder was announced.

"We only can hope that this sentence will serve as a deterrent to those who have conspired and continue to conspire to murder abortion providers," the Tiller family said in a written statement. "Certainly everything possible should be done by the prison system to insure that this man does not continue to foment hatred and violence from his prison cell."

District Judge Warren Wilbert could have made Roeder eligible for parole on the murder charge after 25 years. But he said there was evidence Roeder stalked Tiller and added that killing him in

a church made the crime heinous because a house of worship is meant to be "a place of peace and tranquility."

Roeder took the opportunity to describe abortion procedures in detail, which he had been prohibited from doing during his trial. Most abortions are legal in Kansas, and prosecutors were careful not to turn the trial into a referendum on the issue.
