using some of the \$83,136 the city recently received from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

She said the federal agency recently discovered it still owed the city for damage to the old fire station during a snowstorm in 2006. The snowstorm collapsed the roof at the old fire station at City Hall, which made Colby eligible for federal aid. The agency found out it still owed the city while auditing their own accounts this year, she said.

Armstrong said she was excited about the new system. She said the company took the dimensions from the blueprints of the building and built the system specifically for the gymnasium. It's designed to adapt to how the gym is being used, whether it be a concert, graduation or basketball game, the manager said.

In other news, the council:

Kansas Inc. of Overland Park to do a "mill and overlay" on Range Avenue from I-70 north 1.15 miles to College Drive. The work will cost \$497,847, including preliminary engineering. Workers will strip off the top part of the old asphalt and put down a new overlay.

City Manager Carolyn Armstrong said the Kansas Department of Transportation will pay the city for 75 percent of the costs up to a maximum of \$400,000 under the KLINK program for city-owned links that carry state highways. (Range is part of K-25.) The state will pay \$373, 385 and the city will spend \$124, 461, said Armstrong.

The city also received a \$531,349 bid from McCormick Excavation of Stratton, Colo., and a \$594,306 bid from the Venture Corp. of Great Bend.

• Agreed to hire Penco Engineering from rescue and training communications. • Approved a \$457,847 bid by APAC- Plainville to do the plans and specifications for the mill-and-overlay project for \$15,000. The city also agreed to spend \$40,000 on construction engineering services and inspection for the overlay project. Armstrong said the stay will reimburse 75 percent of the cost.

 Received a plaque from Jonathan Holder, director of communications of the Civil Air Patrol in Kansas, a volunteer auxiliary of the U.S. Air Force, for allowing them to install a radio repeater on the water tower. Technology Director Mike Albers got a plaque for helping with the project.

Albers said the patrol didn't have any radio in Colby until the repeater was installed. He said the agency was looking for a site and there was a spot open on the water tower. He said the repeater will be used for pilot-to-pilot, ground-to-pilot, search-and-

Albers said the patrol is looking to start a unit in Colby. It offers programs for teens, adults and other groups.

The technology director said the city helped install an antenna on the water tower. He said wastewater supervisor Chad Applebury and assistant technology director Brooks Wederski bolted down the antenna.

 Approved a \$25, 856 bid from Sherman & Reilly of Chattanooga, Tenn., for a reel trailer. Armstrong said the trailer carries spools of wire used for underground and overhead electrical distribution. The city also received bids on three trailers from HERS from Olathe for \$30,469, \$25,856 and \$20,681. The council didn't approve the cheapest bid from the company because, councilmen said, the trailer didn't have the equipment the city needed.

Treasury department holding \$2 million in unclaimed money

People can go to www.kansascash.com or call (800) 432-0386 to check the unclaimed property database, he said. Property is listed by name.

"In this economy, we have a lot of families who need to get their money back," McKinney said.

Getting unclaimed property back to people also puts some money back into the economy, he said, since people who get money back might spend it.

Unclaimed property can come from a variety of sources, such as apartment or utility deposits, royalty interests or abandoned bank accounts.

'There are hundreds of sources." the treasurer said.

In 1979, the state passed an unthat unclaimed money doesn't remain in the hands of landlords or banks, but must go to the state. custodian of the money until it is claimed.

McKinney said the law only applies to financial assets and safety a site prompts you to pay or give deposit boxes. One time, they found a 1952 Mickey Mantle baseball card worth \$5,500. Another time, they found first edition X-Men comic books, which have been known to sell for more than \$100,000.

McKinney said the state doesn't sell off family photos or records; they are kept by the treasury department with along with the money.

The treasurer said he stopped in Norton, St. Francis, Goodland and other rural communities on this trip. One of the reasons he comes to rural areas, McKinney said, is that people out here network well.

sioner or register of deeds, there is a filing fee of \$5 or 1 percent of the office's salary. There is also a \$35 fee from the Governmental Ethics Commission and the secretary of state's office. For township offices, there is only a \$1 filing fee.

Candidates can also file by petition. For county offices, a candidate needs the signatures of 3 percent of party members or 4 percent of independent

voters. Township candidates need the signatures of 3 percent of party voters or 10 or 5 percent of independent voters, whichever is higher.

National and state offices up for vote in August are U.S. senator, U.S. representative in District 1, governor and lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general, state treasurer, insurance commissioner, state representative in District 121 and state Board of Education in District 5.

Newspaper plays alien invasion prank

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) - A Jordanian newspaper's April Fool's Day report chronicling a late-night visit by 10-foot-tall aliens in flying saucers sparked public panic and almost led to an emergency evacuation, officials said Monday.

The Al Ghad newspaper published a front-page article April 1 about a UFO landing near the desert town of Jafr, some 185 miles (300 kilometers) from the capital. The report said the UFOs lit up the whole town, interrupted communications and sent fearful residents streaming into the streets.

Jafr's mayor, Mohammed Mleihan, got caught up in the paper's prank and said he sent security authorities in search of the aliens.

"Students didn't go to school, their parents were frightened and I almost evacuated the town's 13,000 residents," Mleihan told The Associated Press. "Peo-

ple were scared that aliens would attack them."

A Jordanian security official said an emergency plan was almost enacted in Jafr.

Mleihan said he may sue the daily for its "big lie," but added that the paper had called to apologize for the inconvenience caused by the joke.

Al Ghad managing editor Moussa Barhoumeh tried to defuse the situation, saying the report has been "blown out of proportion."

"We meant to entertain, not scare people," he said.

Orson Welles caused similar panic in 1938 with his infamous "War of the Worlds" radio broadcast. The live drama's fake news reports about a Martian invasion sparked hysteria among listeners who thought its portrayal of the attack was true.

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
