## Network aims to stop theft

OLMITZ (AP) - Rural residents know that with warmer weather, thieves are more likely to steal high-priced farm equipment, cattle, copper wire and fertilizer chemicals used to make metham-

These thefts cost farmers and other rural residents thousands of dollars every year. A program based in Sedgwick County is trying to stem the problem.

The Agriculture Livestock Information Network, which began last year, sends e-mails to residents in 26 counties informing them about thefts and reporting suspicious activity. Sedgwick County Sheriff's Deputy Travis Clinesmith, who is in charge of the program, said more than a thousand people receive his alerts, and he is trying to get other counties interested.

"If there are suspicious characters around their farm," he said, "they can send an e-mail and describe what it was so people can look for the same sort of things."

Clinesmith, who grew up on a farm near Yates Center, says keeping people informed is key to thwarting thefts in rural areas.

E-mails this spring have already reported on thefts of irrigation equipment parts and tractor batteries. Last week, information came from Oklahoma about the theft of 26 head of rodeo cattle.

Reno County Sheriff's Capt. Steve Lutz notes that thieves also like to hit construction sites. Reno County deputies got reports on 300 property crimes in rural towns
