Paul Edward Layland

Paul Edward Layland, age 90, resident of Fairview Estates in Colby, Kansas, died at 10:10 p.m. on Thursday, April 8, 2010, at Presbyterian Hospital in Denver, Colorado after falling and breaking his hip. He will be missed by many.



He was born June 15, 1919 in Otego, Kansas, one of five children of William Howard and Emma Ethel Olena Layland. The family later moved to Mankato, Kansas, where he graduated from high school finishing in the top third of his class. While in school, he loved playing football and was given the nickname "Tuffie". He also enjoyed hunting and trapping.

After graduation, he enlisted in the U.S. Army and served from 1940 to 1945. He received his basic training in Little Rock, Arkansas in the M-Company, 137th Infantry 35th Division. He was deployed to Liverpool, England on the troopship "Mark Alexander", thirty days before D-Day. On D-Day, Paul landed on Omaha Beach on the last half mile of the beach and waded to shore waist deep water. He earned a bronze star for his achievements in this battle. Paul went on to Belgium where he was wounded before the Battle of the Bulge. He received two purple hearts for his injuries.

After the war, he returned to Mankato and began working for Conoco. Paul worked for Conoco for the next thirty years. He met and married Pauline Zelma Brittain Dillman, June 6, 1951, in the United Berean Church in Mankato. Pauline was a war widow with two daughters, Cogie Ann and Sandra Kay Dillman. Paul raised Cogie and Sandy as his own and considered them his daughters for the rest of his life.

The family moved to Hays, Kansas in 1954. They lived in Hays for three years until Paul was transferred to Colby, Kansas. Paul spent the remaining years of his life in Colby. He served the community for a time as the director of the Colby Chamber of Commerce.

Paul was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion, St. Thomas Masonic Lodge No. 306, ISIS Shrine Legion of Honor and Colby Chapter 442 of the Order of the Eastern Star. He was an avid golfer and supported the Colby Country Club. He was a goal setter. After his first hip surgery, he wanted to make it to the state wrestling tournament in Salina, Kansas and his ninetieth birthday. He achieved both of those goals. He was very proud of his grandchildren and his great-grandchildren.

Paul was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Pauline; his parents; two brothers, Hurley and Orville Dean Layland; and two sisters, Irene Ross and Joyce Endsley.

He is survived by his daughters, Cogie Ann (Dillman) Bradrick-Heigele, Salina, Kansas; and Sandra K. (Dillman) Kriss, and husband, James L., Colby; six grandchildren, Mark Bradrick, Arlington, Texas; Vanessa Thompson, Maui, Hawaii; Kevin Paul (Cindi) Kriss, Colby; Karla (Michael) Brothers, Denver, Colorado; James J. (Robin) Kriss, Arvada, Colorado; and Thomas A (Michelle) Kriss, Emporia, Kansas; and also seventeen great-grandchildren; two great-great-grandchildren and many nieces and nephews.
