The first is the bestseller "Swan Thieves" by Elizabeth Kostova. Robert Oliver is a hospital patient. Andrew Marlow, his psychiatrist, is trying to understand why Oliver, himself an artist with the flair and personality of a genius, has destroyed a famous painting. Marlow finds that delving into Oliver's past paints him as less than fully transparent as he uncovers turmoil, betrayal, requited love and more.


Our last Booked for Lunch of the season will be Wednesday at noon. Mike Baughn will be talking. Come have lunch with us!




