

Legislators have been hoping all year that tax collections will stabilize so that at least they'll have solid figures when they set targets for raising taxes or cutting spending. Work on tax and budget issues fell significantly behind because they wanted better numbers.

'This whole session has been a chicken-and-egg process," said Senate Majority Leader Derek Schmidt, an Independence Republican. "My instinct at this point is that we just have to start voting."

Parkinson has said it would be irresponsible for the state to try to eliminate the shortfall in its budget by cutting spending only, and many legislators, including the Senate's GOP leaders, agree.
