



Ask Dr. Brothers

Veteran has run out of patience

Dear Dr. Brothers: Something is very wrong. Ever since I came home from Iraq, I've been on edge. I've been a police officer for eight years, and I've never felt like this. I have zero patience for dealing with simple things that I never would have thought twice about before I left. The guys at the station have noticed this, too. Sometimes I feel like I'm going to explode, and I don't want to. What's wrong with me? – L.B.

Dear L.B.: The wars in Iraq and Afganistan, which we are fighting under very difficult circumstances that increase feelings of vulnerability, are notorious for creating emotionally damaged soldiers. There is no point in berating yourself about this, and it doesn't remove the need for understanding and perhaps some therapy. The fact that as a police officer you are trained to use your survival instincts may be compounding your readjustment problem, since the war may be contributing to a hair-trigger supersensitivity on the job.

A survey by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the U.S. Bureau of Justice Assistance found that officers who had served in Iraq were experiencing a blurring of the lines for appropriate behavior on the job. Some were tempted to use warlike responses to criminal encounters, while others found it difficult to take minor complaints of citizens to heart when it was easy to compare simple problems to the way of life in war-torn countries. The fact that you may have been involved in urban warfare makes it even more difficult to differentiate, as your two worlds may be blurring together. You also may need some retraining or ride-alongs to help get yourself on solid footing at your job again.



Famous Hand

This deal occurred in a match between Argentina and the United States. At the first table, with an Argentine pair sitting North-South, the bidding went as shown. North's five-notrump bid was a continuation of Blackwood and asked for kings. At the same time, it guaranteed that the partnership had all four aces.

Strongly influenced by his powerful suit, South ignored his partner's inquiry for kings and leaped to seven diamonds. This would have worked out well had the spades been divided 2-2, but with the actual 3-1 division, South had to go down one.

North could have averted this outcome had he used the Grand Slam Force convention. After South responded five hearts, showing two aces, North should have bid six clubs. This would have bypassed the Blackwood five-notrump bid asking about kings, and would instead have inquired about South's trump holding (spades had been agreed upon as the trump suit), asking South to bid a grand slam if he held two of the top three spade honors.

South would have responded with six spades – denying possession of the A-Q – and the bidding would have ended right there.

At the second table, with the U.S. now holding the North-South cards, the bidding started exactly the same way. But over South's four-spade bid, North, completely disregarding Blackwood and the Grand Slam Force as though he had never heard of either of them, went directly to six spades, which closed the auction.

Very unscientific, you might well say, but the winning action on this particular occasion. North lost only a trump trick, chalked up the slam and went on to the next hand.
