Neither team was able to score in the first inning. James held the Monarchs scoreless in the second, striking out a batter for the third out.

The Eagles got things going in the bottom of the second. James hammered a line drive to left center, scoring Stones to make the score 1-0. Then junior Andrew Ketchum drove in James with a high line-drive single to right center.

Later on, Stones let a grounder get under his glove at first base, leaving runners on first and third with one out in the top of the third. Then James buckled down and struck out the next two batters.

Stones walloped a pitch to center that More's outfielder dropped, allowing sophomore Dalaan Organ to advance to third and Stones to second in the bottom of the third. Then Woofter was hit by a pitch, loading the bases. James belted a single, scoring Organ to make it 3-0.
