

Wrestlers sign with colleges

Three Colby College wrestlers, Ganbayar Sanjaa, Bekzod Abdurakhmonov and Patrick Fletcher, have agreed to wrestle at four-year colleges next year.

Sanjaa signed with American University in Wash- ented. ngton. He is a two-time junior college All-American and won the National Junior College Athletic championship in the 149-pound weight class last year. Sanjaa went 25-2 this season and 69-8 over his two years at the college. He took second at nationals at 149 this season.

Sanjaa will not be the first Trojan to wrestle for American University. Muzaffar Abdurakhmonov, a division this season with a 20-13 record. Augsburg two-time national champion at Colby in 2002 and 2003, and the older brother of Bekzod, wrestled for American in 2004 and 2005.

American University finished with a school record 14th-place finish at nationals last season. The school had wrestlers finish third, fifth and eighth at nation-

Bekzod Abdurakhmonov signed with Clarion University, a Division I school in Pennsylvania. He is a two-time All-American at 165. He went 24-2 this season and his career record was 63-9. He was a runner up at nationals in both his years at the college.

Coach Steve Lampe said Bekzod will have to get stronger to compete against tougher wrestlers at the Division I level.

"He's working really hard in the weight room," the

Lampe said Sanjaa and Bekzod are smart and tal-

"Smart athletes make better athletes," he said The coach said both wrestlers were technically sound on their feet, on top and bottom.

Fletcher will be wrestling at Augsburg University, a four-year division III Lutheran school in Minneapolis.

Fletcher qualified for nationals in the heavyweight won the national championship for the 11th time in 20 years last season. They had eight All-Americans

and three wrestlers who took second at nationals. Lampe said Fletcher is fast, explosive and coachable. He said he was good enough to be an All-American this year, but he got in a tough bracket at nationals.

Fletcher will wrestle for the Auggies as a sophomore, while Abdurakhmonov and Sanjaa will both be juniors.
