Can I delete those things that God offers that I don't want, or instantly download those things I do?

And now, rather than having to wait a while for God to get back to me, I can instantly blame God if, within a span of a few nanoseconds, God does not reply to and give me my desired "need."

Let's be honest. It's never a "want," always a "need." And, of course, if the response is slow in coming, or doesn't seem to be showing up at all, then the problem is surely not on my end. There must be a malfunction in the heavenly cyberspace, or even worse, with the great Computer Tech in the Sky.

I recently heard about an acronym that computer trouble shooters use - PICNIC. It means

Problem In Chair, Not In Computer. The glitch lies in the person trying to operate the computer, and not in the computer itself. I have tried really hard to come up with an equally suitable acronym, but the best I can do is PIPNIG -Problem In Person, Not In God.


